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

Yamuna water level nears warning mark

NEW DELHI, AUGUST 2

The government is ready to deal with flood-like situation in the national Capital following information that Haryana has discharged water from Hathni Kund barrage that may cause rising water level in Delhi from midnight. It is likely to cross the warning level by tomorrow morning.

"Due to discharge of 1,59,000 cusecs of water from Hathni Kund Barrage in Haryana yesterday, the water level in the Yamuna has gone up. At 6 pm, it was recorded at 203.39 m," said

The water level initially rose, but is now steady. Post-midnight the water level will again start rising, though it is likely to stay around the warning level.

The warning level for the Yamuna is 204 m and the danger level is 204.83 m. The highest water level of 207.49 m in the river was recorded in 1978.

The Irrigation and Flood

Control Department of the government had last month deployed 18 motor boats in areas, including Badarpur, Burari, Soniya Vihar, Jagatpur, Surghar, Wazirpur, Boat Club, Geeta Colony, Shamshan Ghat, Haithi Ghat, Chilla Village, Mayur Vihar, Batla House, Kalindi Kunj and Bawana Nehar.

"The boats are still stationed there to evacuate riverside dwellers," he added.

Heavy rain in several parts of Himachal triggered landslides and disrupted normal life in interior areas. Three bailey bridges were damaged in the Sumagh area of Rampur in Shimla district and chunks of land were eroded while a four-storey under-construction house collapsed on the Mehli-Junga road in the suburbs of the state capital. The foundation of a house slid due to heavy rain in Lower Kaithu but no loss of life was reported.

Three shops were damaged and three persons received minor injuries when a tree fell on them near Lakkar Bazaar in Shimla. Traffic jams on the road was a common sight as JCB machines were deployed to remove debris on many roads, especially in the interior areas. The rain

uprooted trees at some places in Shimla, Dharamsala and other places and minor landslides occurred at many places in Kangra and Mandi districts.

However, most of the roads which were blocked due to heavy rain during the past 48 hours were cleared and normal traffic was resumed, except in Sirmaur.


Chief Secretary VC Pharka has directed the officers concerned to ensure restoration of traffic on all roads and see to it that there was no disruption of traffic during the apple marketing season. Dharamsala, which was the wettest in the region, received a record rainfall of 208 mm while Palampur received 104 mm rain, followed by Baijnath 62 mm, Jogindernagar 61 mm, Gaggal 60 mm, Nahan 17 mm and Shimla 14 mm.The temperatures minimum dropped marginally in mid and higher hills.

21 rhinos, 221 deer die in Kaziranga floods


Guwahati: As many as 310 animals, including 221 hog deer and 21 one-horned rhinos, in Kaziranga National Park (KNP) lost their lives due to the devastating Assam floods. According to the KNP Divisional Forest Officer Suvasish Das, 310 animals were killed by floods since July 25 this year. Out of this, 221 were hog deer and 21 were one-horned rhinos, he said. Among the killed rhinos, 10 were calves aged between two to six months, Das said. "Flood level this year is much higher compared to 2012, but animal mortality was highest in 2012," he said. PTI

No end in sight to flooding woes

adipakkam, once a tiny village panchayat, now meets the burgeoning demands of its middle and upper middle class residents. The town, now merged with the Greater Chennai Corporation (GCC), not only houses some of the city's oldest areas, but also the newer additions. However, the list of civic problems across old and new areas remains mostly the same.

Rain, devastation and inundation are some of the words residents of Madipakkam want to forget. The merger with GCC has not given them any solution to these issues so far.

Kubera Nagar resident K. Vidhya said roads and stormwater drains became part of the infrastructure only in the past five years.

Repeated inundation has dimmed the hopes of Madipakkam residents waiting for a permanent remedy

"But residents are still apprehensive about inundation problems during rain, as the stormwater drains were not properly constructed and connected with the main drain on the southern part of Madipakkam. We keep our fingers crossed as we don't know what would happen once the rain starts," she said.

A resident of Periyar Nagar Extension, Kasi Viswanathan said despite their protests, the height of the road was increased and with the new layer of road the rainwater would not fall into the drains. "Instead it would maroon several areas just like in 2015. Many streets in the ward have to be blacktopped and milling

of roads before re-laying them should be made mandatory," he said.

Kubera Nagar, Ram Nagar South, Rajaji Nagar, Periyar Nagar and Lakshmi Nagar of Madipakkam serve as a natural drain for rain water from upper areas of Madipakkam. Repeated inundation has dimmed the hopes of residents getting a permanent remedy for the problem.

But for these lapses, roads and streets lights have been added to the infrastructure in the past five years. "Of the 392 roads and streets measuring over 81 km, 94 per cent have been blacktopped with stormwater drain facility. Remaining road works would be completed before the end of August," said E. Ponnusami, ward 188 Councillor.

Mr. Ponnusami said over 2,600 LED lights were provided to replace the old ones.



NEW DELHI, PTI: The flood situation in Assam and Bihar remained grim with 15 more deaths reported on Monday. Two persons died and three others are feared to have been washed away in rain-related incidents in Uttarakhand and Maharashtra.

According to the Assam State Disaster Management Authority (ASDMA), three more deaths were reported in the state, taking the toll to 34. Two persons were killed at Bilasipara and Chapar in Dhubri district, while one death was reported in Barpeta town.

1,659 villages in 21 districts are affected by the floods.

Authorities are running 366 relief camps and distribution centres, where over 1.25 lakh people have taken shelter.

More than one lakh

hectares of crop area are under flood water across the state.

Carcass of a female rhino was found with its horn intact near Amkatoni camp in the flooded Kaziranga National Park (KNP).

So far, 13 rhinos have drowned in the floods which have also claimed the lives of 15 hog deer, two wild boars and two snakes.

Over 100 wild animals, including 10 one-horned rhinos, swamp deer and hog deer have been rescued.

The Brahmaputra river is flowing above the danger mark at Nematighat in Jorhat and Dhubri town, while its tributar-More than 11 lakh people in ies Dhansiri at Numaligarh in Golaghat and Beki at Road Bridge in Barpeta are flowing above the normal level. Monsoon revival in Rajasthan

Revival of the Southwest monsoon has triggered moderate to heavy rainfall in several parts of Rajasthan since Friday,

DHNS reports from Jaipur.

Though situation in the state is largely under control, the district administration in eastern Rajasthan is ready to meet any emergency. The state's watershed department said the

rain has filled up several major reservoirs.

Statistics revealed that east Rajasthan has received 34% surplus rain, while the downpour is 15% below average on the western side. Moderate to heavy rain in Kota, Jaipur and Udaipur divisions has brought more water to the catchment areas.

The state's weather department said Rajasthan has an overall 9% surplus rain this year than what it received in the

Sarakki residents yet to come out of flood shock

BENGALURU: People living next to Sarakki lake never realised what a waterbody could do if its boundaries are breached, until their homes were flooded on Thursday and Friday.

Even after three days of heavy downpour in the city, people are yet to come to terms with the flash floods. Although water has receded and many homes which were inundated have been cleaned up, several houses remain marooned. The part of Sarakki lake near Jaraganahalli stinks to the high heaven.

The lake, spread over 84 acres, has two waste-weirs. One has been closed while the other has been converted into a boxtype drain, which has been completely choked with plastic disposables. There is no outlet for excess water, except for flooding the entire Jaraganahalli and the surrounding places.

Lokesh, a resident, could not drain the water from his house. Built below the ground level,

his house has become a pool. He tried to pump out the water but the ground water level in the area has swelled. "If it rains today, my house will get completely inundated," he said, clearing the blockage in the side-drain.

Families living near the lake

recalled the Friday horror when the whole area converted into a lake. "I felt the lake is going to swallow all of us. The water level was increasing alarmingly. We just prayed to God that it doesn't rain anymore," Sharadamma said.

BBMP staff have been work-

ing round the clock to clear the blockage but they are yet to achieve success even after three days. A senior BBMP engineer said, "For the last three days, I have been heading for the lake in the morning and returning home in the night."

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Heavy rain in Mumbai cripples road, rail traffic

MUMBAI, DHNS: Mumbai sub- The Powai lake that provides Raigad district recorded 290 ed in the Main line of Central urbs received severe pounding from the monsoon rain on Monday, as it recorded more than 100 mm downpour in 24 hours that crippled road and rail traffic.

The three major water bodies in the city began to overflow as a result of the incessant rains. The Vihar lake inside Mumbai's Sanjay Gandhi National Park started to overflow in the morning, while the Tulsi lake -also located in the parkbegan spilling over on July 19.

water for industrial use has been overflowing since July 2.

Overnight rainfall affected Thane, Palghar and Raigad districts that abut the commercial capital. The Vihar lake received 320 mm rainfall, followed by Tulsi (300 mm) and Bhandup Complex (260 mm).

Regional Meteorological Observatory in the city said rainfall was 111 mm in the 24hour period up to 0830 hours, consistent with the average rains for the season. Karjat in

mm of rains, while Roha reported 220 mm downpour.

Thane city and the neighbouring Kalyan township received rainfall of 201 mm, while the amount of downpour in Ulhasnagar was 190 mm, Murbad and Vikramgad areas (Palghar district) 130 mm.

Floods cut off a dozen villages in the Mumbai metropolitan Region due to heavy rains and overflowing of Tansa, Ulhas and Bhatsa rivers.

Railways due to derailment of a local train near Kalyan station at 9.30 am. Service in the line resumed at 12.20 am. Mumbai Monorail also developed a technical snag when a rake stopped near the Bhakti Park area of Wadala.

Heavy rains also lashed Ratnagiri and Sindhudurg districts in Konkan region, causing floods in streams near Sawantwadi, Khed and Chiplun towns. Severe downpour was also recorded in Amboli ghat.

Lonavla ghats near Pune recorded 200 mm rains, while the downpour was 100 mm in Koyna valley.

The latest spell of rains could be attributed to the moisture from the circulation formed over Gujarat. A weak off-shore trough along the West Coast between Maharashtra Coast and Coastal Karnataka also intensified the rains over Mumbai, which would continue to receive moderate to heavy showers in the next 24 hours, according to Skymet Weather.

a "normal" rainfall while September is expected to witness "above normal" precipitation.



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

Wave after wave wash away Assam villages

Guwahati, Aug. 1: The first wave came in April. By the time it was August, two more had swamped the state.

Numbers tell the story of the flood that has spared only six of Assam's 34 districts, left the state a waterlogged waste of washed-away villages and affected more than 2.6 million people.

At last count, over 2,800 villages and two lakh hectares of crops had been swept away.

"Normally it is the upper Assam districts that are more affected," said Dipak Kumar Sarma, chief executive officer of the Assam State Disaster Management Authority. "This time it is all across."

Sarma said "three waves of floods since April" had impacted the entire state, from upper Assam to lower Assam districts. "That only 28 people have died so far is because we are now in a position to provide flood warnings at the circle level 24 hours before they strike and can do so with a 70 per cent accuracy. The destruction of homes and crops can't, however, be prevented."

Floods since April spare only six of the state's 34 districts

In Kaziranga National Park, a sanctuary for the Indian one-horned rhino, animals had to be rescued, while others floundered through the water or strayed across roads, many of them run over by speeding vehicles.

Figures provided by the state's water resources department revealed the extent of the devastation. The Assam valley part of the Brahmaputra river has lost approximately 7.4 per cent (4,000sqkm) of its land area because of riverbank erosion.

The Brahmaputra, at the end of the day, flows by the whims of rivers that flow into it, from states and countries that lie across the border. Rivers such as the Lalai, Aie, Taklai, Kanamakra and Langkhar — that flow down the foothills of Bhutan — have created havoc in lower Assam districts such as Chirang, Baksa and Kokrajhar.

The Kulsi, Batha and the Jinari that flow in from the

Garo hills in western Meghalaya impact lower Assam districts such as Goalpara and Kamrup. Around two lakh people have been affected in these districts.

The Subansiri and the Lohit, which flow down the hills of central and eastern Arunachal Pradesh, have inundated upper Assam districts like Dhemaji, Lakhimpur and Sonitpur districts on both banks of the Brahmaputra that cuts through Assam. More than four lakh people have been left homeless in these districts.

But the worst, meteorology experts say, is yet to come.

A report prepared by the meteorological department says the country's east and Northeast received 647.9mm rainfall between June 1 and July 27 against a monsoon-season normal of 735.9mm.

"The rainy season is not yet over and whether the northeastern states receive ex-

cess or deficit rainfall is something we will get to know only at the end of the season, which is about the beginning of August, give or take a few days," a Met official said.

As much as public opinion in Assam stands against river dams, it is one such across the Serlui tributary of the Barak that has prevented major flooding in districts such Cachar, Karimganj and Hailakandi towards the southern tip of Assam.


Built across the Serlui in western Mizoram's Kolasib district, the dam has prevented the tributary from adding to the flow of the Barak that enters Assam from northern Manipur, thus preventing flooding in Barak districts for two years now.

Elsewhere, though, Assam's rivers have continued on their course of mayhem. "For the past week we've been practically living in water. Four of my buffaloes have died in the floods," said Jyoti Prakash Pegu, a resident of Dhunaguri village on the banks of the Brahmaputra in Lakhimpur district. "It's the same story every year for us."

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9 killed, 10 hurt as building collapses in rain-hit Thane

THANE, July 31: Nine persons, including four children and three women, were killed and 10 others injured when a residential building collapsed in the powerloom town of Bhiwandi here this morning amid heavy rains, police said.

The two-storey structure, housing seven to eight families, at Gaibi Nagar under Shanti Nagar police station limits in the town, crashed at around 9:30 am, Bhiwandi tehsildar Vaishali Lambate said.

Among the deceased were a woman and her four sons.

Initially, five persons had died in the incident, but the toll rose after more bodies were pulled out from the debris of the collapsed building.

An emergency meeting was convened by Thane Guardian

Minister Eknath Shinde at Bhiwandi Nizampur Municipal Corporation office in view of the incident. District Collector Mahendra Kalyankar and Municipal Commissioner E Ravindran were present at the meeting.

The Collector had earlier rushed to the site to supervise the relief and rescue operation which was hampered by the heavy rains that lashed the district today.

Eight of the deceased were identified as – Shahjahan Khurshid Aalam Ansari (42), her four sons Muddashir Khurshid Aalam Ansari (20), Saif Khurshid Aalam Ansari (17), Khalid Khurshid Aalam Ansari (17), Khalid Khurshid Aalam Ansari (15) and Shakib Khurshid Aalam Ansari (11), and Aayesha Mobin Ansari (38), Suphiya Shahnavaz Shah (19) and Yehem Ejaz Shah (10).

One of the deceased is yet to be identified.

Nine of the injured were rushed to Thane Civil Hospital where they were being treated for their injuries, the tehsildar said, adding that one person has been admitted to a hospital in Bhiwandi. It was yet to be ascertained whether the structure was in the list of dangerous buildings, sources said.

Following the heavy rainfall since early this morning, many low-lying areas were waterlogged in Thane city and surrounding areas.

Thane Municipal Commissioner Sanjeev Jaiswal, after visiting the disaster control cell, issued a warning to residents of the city not to step out of their houses unless it was absolutely essential. – PTI

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Floods creating hurdles in BSF patrolling R DUTTA CHOUDHURY

GUWAHATI, July 31: Heavy floods and severe erosion have caused severe hurdles in the functioning of the Border Security Force (BSF) deployed along the India-Bangladesh border to guard the frontier of the country. The situation has even forced the BSF to shift some of its border outposts (BOPs) to safer places. However, on the positive side, the strength of the river wing of the BSF in Dhubri sector has been increased, which resulted in overall improvement of the functioning of the border guarding force during the floods.

Highly placed sources in the BSF told The Assam Tribune that flood along with

erosion are turning out to be major problems for the personnel of the border guarding force. Almost all the BOPs located on the chars along the international border have been submerged, making life miserable for the personnel of the

Assam-Banglaborder

force. Because of severe erosion, at least six of the 17 BOPs located on the chars have been shifted and these are now operating from vessels. However, sources said that despite the hardship, the BSF personnel are carrying on patrolling along the riverine international border with speed boats and engine fitted boats specially hired for the purpose.

Sources revealed that the water wing of the BSF has been strengthened, which has improved the overall performance in guarding the riverine international border. The strength of the wing has been increased to two battalions and along with that, the number of speed boats available with the wing has also been increased. The increase of the strength of the wing has been very helpful in the area, particularly during the floods.

Though cattle smuggling through the riverine international border is still a major headache for the personnel of the BSF, for the last one week or so, because of heavy floods, smuggling has come down. Sources said that normally, the

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1.7 lakh affected in Garo Hills floods, waters receding

TURA, July 31: The devastating floods in the Garo Hills region has affected more than 1.76 lakh people specially in the plain belt areas mainly due to incessant rainfall across the North East leading to huge surge in the waters of the Brahmaputra.

. After eight days of continuous water rise, affected victims have heaved a sigh of relief after water began to recede in most places. But return to normalcy may, however, take weeks, if not months.

"Thankfully, the rains have relented and there has been across the region. We are trying to ensure the families af-

fected are taken care of," said Meghalaya Speaker and local MLA, AT Mondal.

Meanwhile, SG Esmatur Mominin (Rahibul), MDC of Shyamnagar constituency has raised the demand for providing Gratuitous Relief (GR) for a period of 30 days after a visit to the affected areas in the plain belt region of West Garo Hills.

The State Government earlier announced a 10 day GR for the affected families. A decision to continue with GR after 10 days will be taken after a review.

"We have visited most of the areas affected by the flood and the water may take about two months to completely clear. To reduction of water levels help the flood victims we demand at least 30 days GR to be provided," said Mominin.

"The flood affected areas under Phulbari, Rajabala and Tikrikilla has seen most roads submerged and thousands of houses are under water", he added.

"Though water is reducing, it is still over danger levels. We desperately require fresh drinking water and temporary toilets," said a flood victim camp* ing by the AMPT Road near New Bhaitbari. Schools are also being used as temporary shelters while a sizeable number of people are also staying on roadside along with their animals.

Damage assessment is being carried out by the district administration and is expected to take weeks to complete, though initial reports have already been sent to the Centre.

27.50 lakh affected in Bihar floods

PATNA, July 31: The flood situation remained grim in 12 districts of Bihar where an estimated 27.50 lakh people were affected though no fresh casualty was reported, with the toll standing at 26.

Rivers Ghaghra-Darauli and Gangpur-Siswan in Siwan disrict, Bagmati-Benibad in Muzaffarpur district, Koshi-Baltara in Khagaria district, Mahananda-Dhengraghat in Purnia district and Jhhawa in Katihar district were flowing above the danger mark inundating 12 districts.

With several rivers in spate, as many as 12 districts have been flooded, affecting over 27.50 lakh people spread over 200 lakh hectare area, the Disaster Management Department said in a statement today.

The flood has also damaged crops in 3.39 lakh hectares of land, it said.

Altogether 5521 houses and 4641 hutments have been damaged, the statement said, adding the damage to houses/hutments has been assessed at Rs 67.91 lakh while the valuation of public properties damaged in the flood was being assessed.

Launching massive rescue and relief operations, the state government has pressed into service 1063 boats to rescue the affected people, with 5.98 lakh of them already shifted to safer places. – PTI

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
Flyovers fail harvesting test

Despite HC Order In 2007, Rainwater Projects Along Roads A Non-Starter

New Delhi: The monsoon mayhem that has been crippling Delhi for the past many years would have been long gone had civic agencies carried out rainwater harvesting along roads and flyovers following a 2007 high court order. While most flyovers that have come up since then bear some semblance of RWH, roads do not have any such system so far.

Vinod Jain, director of NGO Tapas, who had filed a plea in the high court in 2005, said the order was issued in 2007 but the agencies had not achieved much progress. "PWD has started implementing RWH on its flyovers. While the system on new structures is still alright, that on old flyovers is often faulty or not properly maintained," he said. "For instance, a multi-department team that inspected the AIIMS flyover last year found that the pits were clogged with garbage. At the Panchshila and Andrews Ganj flyovers, pipes meant to carry water open up

on the road itself while at the Chirag Dilli flyover, the RWH system has been connected to the storm water drain."

Jain will be approaching the National Green Tribunal on Wednesday with a plea that waterlogging on roads can be prevented if agencies are made to carry out RWH along roads.

According to an NGT order of August 2015, no flyover or bridge can be approved witho-

ut RWH. PWD officials claim that all its new flyovers and elevated roads have built-in RWH system and they are, in fact, using a new technique to improve collection of water. "We have carried out RWH on our new elevated road from Meera Bagh to Vikaspuri. For the first time, we have received no complaints of waterlogging on the Azadpur flyover. We are also using a new material and a better filter system, which can

collect about 95% of the runoff," said an official.

The Delhi Metro too has been asked to carry out RWH and it has provided pits at 464 locations with a capacity of 8,607 cubic metres. "In the past one year, 93 new rainwater harvesting pits have been added," said a DMRC spokesperson.

However, DMRC has provided drains to keep its elevated tracks free from waterlogging, which run along the pillars

supporting the tracks and open up a few feet above the road. Thousands of litres of water each monsoon have been flushed onto main roads, adding to the waterlogging problem. While DMRC says that it is the responsibility of road owning agencies to provide for drainage of this water, an official from PWD claims their drains were made several years ago and do not have the capacity to deal with the additional water flow. "DMRC cannot pump such quantities of water onto roads and expect others to clean up after them," said an official.

Meanwhile, of the three municipal corporations that own a majority of roads in the city, east and north civic bodies have not made any provision for RWH on their roads. Some work has been done by the South Corporation with officials claiming that a majority of the 104 wards under it have carried out small-scale RWH at 3-5 sites each. However, most of these RWH pits are next to drains where water level may already be high enough for the system to be ineffective.

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Govt told to demolish illegal structures in central ridge

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NEW DELHI: The National Green Tribunal has asked both the Union government and the Delhi government to demolish illegal religious structures in the central ridge area near the Birla Temple in Delhi within two weeks.

A bench headed by Justice UD Salvi directed the Union ministry of urban development and Delhi government to knock down two religious structures and a platform, identified as encroachment on the 7.5 acres of the ridge area.

"We direct that the respondent no. 2 and 3 in collaboration with each other shall carry out the demolition of the said identified structures within two weeks. "We further direct the commissioner of police to grant every police assistance to them for demolition," the bench, said.

It warned that if any "laxity" is shown in executing this order,

it will hold officers concerned personally liable and will resort to coercive measures against them. The direction came after the ministry of urban development submitted that the demarcation of the area where illegal structures are to be demolished has been completed and two religious structures and a plat-

form have been identified as encroachments. The order came on a contempt petition filed by KC Bhargava, who alleged that a Trust "in connivance with the NDMC and other authorities has illegally constructed a road, parking, temple and other constructions within the central ridge area."

Null gives nod tor 10 new fire trucks

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NEW DELHI: The National Green Tribunal on Tuesday gave permission to the Delhi Fire department to go ahead with the registration of 10 new diesel vehicles, which comply with BS-IV emission norms.

A bench, headed by NGT chairperson Justice Swatanter Kumar gave the relief on Tuesday after being informed that the department has already scrapped 67 diesel vehicles, which were more than 10 years old.

"We permit the 10 vehicles of the fire department to be registered by the Delhi RTO only after certificate of condemning and dismantling of old diesel vehicles is produced," the bench said.

The tribunal's order came after advocate Tarunvir Singh Khehar, appearing for the Delhi government, informed the bench that the fire department has scrapped 67 of its old diesel vehicles and bought 10 new diesel vehicles, which are BS-IV compliant.

The fire department had approached the green court seeking registration of its new vehicles as the tribunal had last year banned the registration of new diesel vehicles as well as re-registration after 10 years. Later, the Supreme Court had also banned registration of diesel-run SUVs and cars having engine capacity beyond 2000cc in Delhi and the National Capital Region.
