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Mamata does a U-turn

Kolkata, 4 August

Chief Minister Mamata Banerjee todaydeclared 12 districts flood-hit and would call on Prime Minister Narendra Modi on 11 August to seek relief package for the massive damage caused by the floods that claimed 83 lives till now.

The move is a shift from her earlier stand about not taking Central assistance for flood relief. Sources at Nabanna said the aid for agriculture sector alone would amount to over Rs 15,000 crore.

Iterating her earlier move to prevent Opposition from reaching out to people by collecting and distributing relief, Miss Banerjee today urged nobody to collect donations from people on the pretext of helping the flood victims. Don't distribute used clothes as it offends people, she said adding. "If anyone is interested to help them then he/she can donate in the CM's Relief Fund"

Miss Banerjee said she had called up Union power minister Pijush Goyal this morning to request him to instruct DVC not to release water any further "It may be your (meaning DVC's) option to submerge us but not ours.



DVC is doing business in Bengal and is in turn submerging us. Please spare us from drowning," she told Mr Goyal. Miss Banerjee rued that she took up the issue with former Prime Minister Manmohan Singh but nothing has improved. She said that the issue will be taken up along with Central assistance during her Delhi visit on 11-12 August. Miss Banerjee had on Saturday told media persons at Nabanna, "We will not go to Centre for any aid. Did the Centre send any money to combat the disaster in Darjeeling? We are poor people's government and will go begging door to door if needed to raise funds.'

After holding a video conference with DMs and SPs of the flood affected districts, Miss Banerjee said 12 out of 20 districts are flood-affected which means that around 70 per cent of the state is flood hit. "We will ask Centre for funds from the National Disaster Relief Fund ~ which includes shares of all the

ndia's 7500 km long coast line, home to over 171 million people, is under threat and the government machinery meant to manage it is in disarray. The coastal zone management authorities (CZMA's) at the national and state level are orphaned bodies with no financial support. except what they raise by charging fees from those wanting project clearance. They are packed with ex-officio bureaucrats from various departments with limited expertise. Their meetings are spent in discussing project applications. They clear 80% of projects but never go back to monitor or check violations. They don't have maps with requisite details. They have not even marked out the high tide line.

These are the shocking findings of a report prepared by a group of environmental activists cum experts from the Centre for Policy Research, New Delhi and the Namati Environmental Justice Program. The authors interviewed sitting and ex-members of the CZMAs, analysed minutes of 350 meetings of the CZMAs and looked at high court and National Green Tribunal cases over the years.

national and CZMAs. The NCZMA discussed 157 agenda items between 2003 and 2013 of which 73 related to reclassifying a piece of the coast so that it can he used differently. Just 12 cases of violations and just one case of reviewing what the state CZMAs were doing was discussed.

The state CZMAs were initially given Rs 5 lakh each by the central environment ministry. After that they have been left to their own devices till 2011 when state governments were asked to fund them. Meanwhile each state CZMA has hammered out its own way of raising funds.

In Goa, if you want to set up a commercial institution, you apply to the Goa CZMA and pay Rs 10,000 fees. For setting up anything worth upto Rs 5 crore, you pay processing fees of Rs 25,000 in Gujarat, Rs 1 lakh in Maharashtra or just Rs 10,000 in West Bengal. Since the money is coming from project proposals, maximum time is spent by the state bodies discussing them. In Kerala, Karnataka, Maharashtra and Odisha, over 90% of the agenda items were project proposals.

In other states, this frequency was between 60 to 80%, with only Goa having 46% frequency, according to analysis of meeting minutes between 2010 and 2013.

The report recommends an overhaul with better definition of roles and powers. more resources, participatory planning, bringing in transparency, and improving monitoring and compliance. Otherwise, this bureaucratic mess will be unable to save India's coasts.

Rain returns to city, leaves many areas waterlogged

New Delhi: An extremely humid day gave way to moderate to heavy showers in the city on Tuesday evening. The sudden spell of rain started around 7.30pm and intensified within seconds, leading to waterlogging in some areas.

'No rain was recorded at Safdarjung till 8.30pm since rain in the area started after that. However, large parts of the city recorded rain between 7.15pm and 7.30pm. The next few days will witness similar weather," said a Met official.

The department said there was a cyclonic circulation over Punjab and neighbouring areas because of which there was presence of high levels of moisture in the air, leading to high levels of humidity. There is also a western disturbance over the western Himalayan region which was already moving in an east-northeasterly direction on Tuesday, while another one lies over west Af-

ghanistan and adjoining Iran.

"The next few days will see isolated showers across northwest India. The capital will witness a generally cloudy sky with the possibility of rain and thundershowers in some areas between August 5 and 8. The sharp reduction in rainfall activity since the last

week of July has seen the total rainfall over Delhi fall 15 mm below normal. Till mid-July, Delhi was enjoying a substantial surplus this season, largely due to widespread rainfall in June and parts of July. Northwest India, as a whole, is enjoying a surplus of 6% rain since June 1.

The with southern Peninsula fairly dry, the overall rainfall in the country was 7% below normal on Tuesday.

Haryana plans eco-zone in NCR

Activists Call For Bigger, Buffer Zone Around Asola-Bhatti, Link To Sariska

New Delhi: In what is a piece of good news for those concerned about the welfare of wildlife in Delhi's Asola Bhatti Sanctuary and the adjoining Aravalis, the Haryana government has finally decided to declare an ecosensitive zone around its border—particularly that with Delhi's forests.

An ESZ is a buffer green area where any activity that can impact ecology is restricted.

The exact radius of the ESZ will be finalized only once geo-referencing of the area is complete. The ESZ will also cover sacred grove Mangar Bani, off the Gurgaon-Faridabad highway.

Activists, however, fear an ESZ of a few hundred metres or even a kilometer radius will be of no help. The Faridabad Aravalis, which are covered with scrub forests, comprise a large area. The hills, themselves, are under threat from real estate projects. They also have large tracts of private land that

could be built up anytime.

"The catch is this—the Aravalis in Faridabad are not notified forest, so they have no protection. A kilometre will not even cover the distance up to Badkhal lake. It may only touch Mangar but not cover the entire area. Why doesn't the Haryana government declare the Faridabad Aravalis forest?" said environmentalist Chetan Agarwal.

The Delhi government has been pursuing the ESZ issue with Haryana for a long time now because the states share an important wildlife corridor. Leopards, striped hyenas and jackals have been reported to use this corridor from either side. However, increasing encroachments and infrastructure projects have been eating into the corridor. On the Haryana side of Asola sanctuary, the large green space not yet notified as forest is an important wildlife habitat. The Snow Leopard Trust had documented presence of leopards in the area.

"The width of ESZ will depend on the practical situation on the ground. Existing houses or habitation cannot be moved. There are also

Haryana's ESZ will cover the sacred grove Mangar Bani, but activists say an ESZ of a few hundred metres or even a kilometre radius will be of no help. They say the state should declare the entire Faridabad Aravalis a forest. But the Haryana CM has only promised a 500m buffer zone so far

Delhi forest officials, however, maintained that Haryana has promised a buffer zone of 1km. The ministry of environment, forest and climate change had issued guidelines following a Supreme Court order to all state governments to declare ESZs around their respective forests. "In cases in which sensitive corridors and ecologically im-

portant patches, crucial for landscape linkage, have width even beyond 10km, these should be included in the eco-sensitive zone," say the guidelines.

"The Haryana Aravalis are already part of a natural conservation zone which is a no-construction area. Only construction for recreational purposes is allowed—within a limit of 0.5%. The ESZ notification should be even more stringent and it should help connect Sariska National Park to the Asola wildlife corridor through the Faridabad Arayalis," Agarwal said.

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Faulty plantation drives over two decade have failed to increase Capital's greener,

NEW DELHI: Ten trees for every one cut—
if Delhi had followed this norm to a T,
most parts of the city would have turned
into a dense forest by now.

Over the past two decades, massive afforestation drives were undertaken to compensate for the loss of green cover. According to some reports, nearly 1.8 crore trees were planted in the city since 2001.

But there were problems in the way these drives were carried out. The result: at 20%, Delhi's forest cover falls short of the desired 33% mark.

Most of this plantation happened in areas such as Asola Bhatti, where the forest department and ecology experts got a free hand to plan and execute the afforestation drive. But the remaining areas saw haphazard and poorly planned drives; trees were either planted too close to each other or high-maintenance species were planted.

According to Comptroller and Auditor General of India report in 2009, the Delhi government gave permission to cut 30,863 trees between 2005 and 2008 with a condition that 2.99 lakh saplings will be planted. As per the report, neither could the plantation target be completed nor was the balance plantation charges of over ₹6 crore recovered.

According to the report, only 1.8 lakh trees were re-planted and the government failed

cost of balance plantation (1.19 lakh trees at the rate of ₹650 per tree) from the defaulters.

While things have got better, with stricter implementation over the years, the city has routinely missed

out on its plantation targets. What is worse, in the absence of an audit no record of how many saplings

having survived after the first year of plantation has been maintained.

Plantation and afforestation drives are on to reach the goal of increasing Delhi's forest cover to 25% in the next five years. The plan is to plant 12 lakh saplings this year itself, mostly in the eastern banks of the Yamuna, Asola and Najafgarh areas.

Of this, around 5 lakh will be planted by the forest department, two lakh by the Delhi Development Authority, two lakh by the municipal corporations, one lakh by the PWi lakh by the Delhi Parks and Ga Soclety and around 50,000 by the Cantonment Board.

"A successful afforestation drive around five years to show results. has to be taken about what specie is planted and where. A good tree attracts birds and after that it beceasy as birds help in seed dispersal," Tarun Coomar, Delhi's chief conser of forests.

'Our govt's focus is on planting more trees'

NEW DELHI: A number of plantation drives over the past two decades failed to have the intended impact on improving the capital's greenery, prompting Delhi's environment ministry to mandate a third-party audit for all such campaigns. Hindustan Times speaks to environment minister Asim Ahmed Khan to know what steps the new government is taking to save trees in

Plantation drives over the years have not had the desired effect and Delhi's tree cover is still 20%. What are you doing differently? The biggest change we are rolling out this year is a mandatory audit of these drives. All agencies that carry out plantation drives will have to get them audited by a third party. This will include the numbering of trees planted and looking at the general health of the trees planted. Unless auditing is done, it will not be possible to gauge how much more land is available for plantation as a number of trees that were planted earlier have died. So while they exist on paper, there is nothing on the ground. This space can be used to plant more trees.

What is Delhi government's plan to increase the city's green cover? This year, our main thrust area will be on tree plantation drives. We have to plant a particular number of trees for each tree that is cut and meetings are on to implement this. Saving the city's trees is a priority for us now. We


are looking at new ways, such as increasing tree density in parks, roadsides, schools etc. There is a lot of potential here and getting large swathes of land within the city is difficult.

But most of these plantation drives happen on the periphery while the heart of the city is losing its green cover.

We will have to think innovatively here because the availability of land is a problem. As of now, we have started initiating plantation drives close to where trees are cut. The directions are to look for a place within a radius of 1 kilometre. If that is not possible, we look further away but we want to plant new trees as close to the original area as possible. We also need to look at incorporating trees in our planning. Before an area is planned, we should find out about the number of trees in the area and how the least number of them can be cut. This is also why we increased the security deposit for cutting trees from ₹28,000 to ₹57,000. People need to think twice before

cutting a tree.

NEW DELHI: Delhi is one of the greenest metropolitan cities of India with a 20% forest cover. But it still falls way short of the 33% greenery prescribed by the national forest policy

The Capital has often taken its abundant green cover for granted, with permission for cutting trees easy to come by till even a decade ago. For a city like Delhi, which is growing constantly and exponentially

a constant struggle between urbanisation and preserving the forest has become a daily feature.

"Delhi would have become a desert if it did not

have a forest department that regulated tree cutting Land-hungry Delhi has had a hard time finding peace with its greens," said environment minister Asim Ahmed Khan.

increase Delhi's green cover from 20% to 25% by 2020—a tall order considering the department has found it tough to get any land for plantation.

But it is not just planting new trees that is a problem. Protecting what the city already has also turned out to be a big issue too. The city's lungs, the Ridge is under constant threat with more and more encroachments taking a toll.

"Areas in the Ridge that were constructed before the 1996 notification led to a large number of trees being cut down. Their expansion continues. These structures are bang in the middle of southern Ridge, an area everyone agrees we need to protect," said tree activist Diwan Singh, who has been working for the protection of the green cover in the area.

Even areas that Delhiites love for their green cover are in danger. The Lutyen's zone with decades old Jamun, Peepal, Imli and Neem trees may lose this cover as these trees are ageing and have become weak.

"Plans to start planting now to replace the ageing trees have not really caught on yet. But it is extremely important. These trees will soon be gone and there will be nothing to replace them," said Ravi

Agarwal from NGO Toxics Link. He has worked extensively on tree conservation and the Ridge.


"The residents of this city want trees in summers but not in winters. This attitude will have to change." he said.

The 'green' city can't even take care of the roadside trees it has planted. Despite several orders against concretisation of trees, there are hardly any trees that are given enough space to breathe.

Aditya N Prasad, a lawyer who has waged a constant battle against tree concretization and mauling, has

found that court battles go on forever but the attitudes towards trees don't change. He has filed several suits against government and private agencies cutting or choking trees but has seen little change on the ground.





CHENNAl: Chennalites may have to brace themselves for some shadow play by the weather over the next four days. While the days may be warm, the city is expected to get sharp showers during evenings.

For the past few days, residents have been experiencing inclement weather and various parts of the city have been receiving rain almost every evening or night. However, officials of the Meteorological department note that such sudden showers follow a peaking of temperature during the day. S.R.Ramanan, director, Area Cyclone Warning Centre, said there was no weather system in the Bay of Bengal. "It is common for the State to get convective rain during this

time. While most parts of the sius and 34.4 degree Celsius State will get isolated rain for next few days, Chennai may receive light to moderate rain this week," he said.

On Monday, Nungambakkam and Meenambakkam remaximum temperature 34.6 degree Celrespectively. This July has been a wet month as the city nearly received 205.9 mm of rainfall, which is double the amount of rainfall it usually gets. Similarly, Meenambakkam recorded 134.7 mm of rainfall in July.

The rainfall in July had contributed majorly to the Southwest monsoon that set in June. So far, Nungambakkam and Meenambakkam have received 237.8 mm and 252.1 mm of rainfall respectively since June.

S.P. Thampi, deputy director general of meteorology, Regional Meteorological Centre, Chennai: "The Southwest monsoon has been progressing well and July's rainfall has helped boost the season's average rainfall close to normal in the State and Chennai. However, the monsoon is expected to become subdued after August 15." Though August has had a good start with rain and records 140 mm of rainfall, officials note that the rain in the next few days will decide on how good actually monsoon activity has been to the city.

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Flood situation in Bengal grim, death toll rises to 69, lakhs hit

KOLKATA: The flood situation in West Bengal remained grim on Monday as the barrages in the State and adjoining areas discharged more water. According to the State government officials, among others Damodar Valley Corporation (DVC) has released over 1 lakh cusecs of water since Sunday midnight.

The death toll due to the floods has increased to 69 while 2.1 lakh people have been sheltered in over 1,500 relief camps in the State. About 37 lakh people in 12 districts of the State have been affected by the floods.

Along with 19 teams of National Disaster Response Force (NDRF), the Army has been assisting in flood relief and rescue operations. Army personnel have been deployed at Bardhaman district one of the worst affected districts of the State.

At least 47 municipalities, 210 blocks and 9,691 villages of the State have been affected by rising waters. Thousands of acres of standing crops have been destroyed.

Chief Minister Mamata Banerjee, who visited flood affected district of North 24 Parganas, blamed the release of water from barrages for the deterioration of the situation.

"The flood situation has improved in Birbhum and Murshidabad districts, whereas condition in Bardhaman continues to be the same," Ms. Banerjee told mediapersons before beginning her tour of Ashoknagar in North 24 Parganas.

"The flooding in Hooghly and Howrah districts has

worsened and will deteriorate a bit further as DVC (Damodar Valley Corporation) has released more water," she said. Ms. Banerjee announced a compensation of Rs. 4 lakh to the families of those killed in the floods.

Gujarat, Rajasthan, Odhisha also affected PTI reports from New Delhi:

In Gujarat, 71 people have lost their lives due to floods in 14 districts where 40 lakh people were affected. More than

10 lakh food packets have been distributed to the victims.

In Rajasthan, 38 deaths have been reported during the past few days owing to heavy rainfall and floods. More than 630 people have been rescued from various districts in Rajasthan. Relief materials have been distributed.

In Odisha, 4,80,399 people were affected by the floods which has claimed five lives so far. The Union Home-Minister Singh spoke to Odisha Chief Minister Naveen Patnaik and reviewed the flood situation.

'Sunderbans vulnerable'

KOLKATA: A recent report submitted by the South 24 Parganas district administration to the State government has revealed that at least 8 lakh people in eight blocks in the Sunderbans area are vulnerable to cyclones and floods.

The report paints a sorry picture of the flood and cyclone shelters in these

blocks. In the district 13 blocks are in the Sunderbans.

According to the report, of the 23 traditional flood shelters in the district, seven are in a "dilapidated" condition, two are "damaged" and two others are in need of repairs. As per the report, the flood shelter in the Kantamari area under the Kultali block seems to exist only on paper.

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Rescuers race to flood zones

Myanmar death toll rises

KALAY (MYANMAR): Rescuers raced on Monday to help tens of thousands stranded by rooftop-high floods in Myanmar, as the UN warned that swollen rivers threaten more areas and large swathes of Asia were hit by deadly monsoon rains.

Authorities in Myanmar said the death toll from flash floods and landslides caused by weeks of unrelenting rain rose to 46, with some 200,000 affected and villagers in remote areas forced to use canoes and makeshift rafts.

Hundreds have also perished in recent days in India, Nepal, Pakistan and Vietnam following floods and landslides triggered by a belt of heavy seasonal rains.

Access to many towns in remote northern and western Myanmar has been severed and relief workers fear it could be days before the true extent of the disaster emerges.

"Logistics are extremely difficult. Assessment teams are having a hard time reaching affected areas," said Pierre Peron, spokesman for the United Nations Office for the Coordi-

nation of Humanitarian Affairs.

The UN was "very concerned" by the situation, he said, adding that while flooding had begun to recede in some places, rivers were bursting their banks and inundating new areas.

Relentless downpours were last week exacerbated by Cyclone Komen, which drove fierce winds and heavy rain across the western part of the country.

Residents near Kalay, a town in the impoverished northwestern Sagaing region that remains virtually encircled by deep water, described how their homes were swallowed by the deluge. "There was no warning... we thought it was normal (seasonal flooding)," Aye Myat Su, 30, said from a monastery being used as a temporary shelter in Kalay.

"But within a few hours, the whole house was underwater. My husband had to get onto the roof as there was no way out."

Myanmar's annual monsoon is a lifeline for farmers but the rains and frequent powerful cyclones can also prove deadly.

222 blocks under water but Bengal *not* 'flood-affected'

Calcutta, Aug. 3: The Bengal government has not been able to declare even a single block "flood affected" as the deluge has been caused by the release of water from dams and barrages and not because of incessant rain, officials said.

According to officials of the state home department, a total of 222 blocks in 12 districts have been affected by the rise in water in rivers. But the Bengal government cannot claim any financial assistance from the Centre as the areas cannot be officially declared "flood affected".

Asked about the situation, Mamata Banerjee said in Nabanna this evening: "The problem occurred because DVC (Damodar Valley Corporation) released 90,000 cusecs of water instead of 70,000 cusecs as they had told us. Though the DVC has a capacity to hold 2 lakh cusecs, it rould not do so because of lack of dredging. I will take up the natter with the Centre."

The Telegraph spoke to several government officials who conceded that the state wasn't prepared for the reease of water from the dams and hadn't made the arrangements required to channel the low.

Grave situation

Figures provided by the disaser management department paint a grave picture. According to a release by the department, 222 of the 341 blocks in he state have been affected by he rise in water. The Bengal overnment has set up 2,213 elief camps and a total of 3,63 akh people have taken shelter a them.

"Despite this, the state govrnment has not been able to lectare even a single block lood affected. The deluge has seen caused by the release of vater from dams and barages. It cannot be described as flood. Flood is declared only

when people are marooned because of a rush of water following heavy rain," said a senior Nabanna official.

The official added that the government had failed to create channels for the released water to flow through before the onset of monsoon in June.

Channels are created by dredging rivers and other water bodies.

"If the channels or rivers are unable to bear the release of water from the dams, it is the responsibility of the state government. So floods cannot be declared," the official said.

Sources said rivers and other water bodies are not dredged on a regular basis in Bengal, either because of lack of funds assigned for the projects or the shortage of space to keep the silt for future use.

"The channels and rivers that carry water from the Durgapur barrage have not been dredged for the past 15 years. We could not find a place to keep the silt.... As a result, the ability of the barrage to withhold water from upstream reduced from around 2.5 lakh cusecs to a little over 1 lakh cusecs," the official said.

According to Nabanna officials, the biggest drawback of the state's failure to declare the districts "flood affected" was that it made Bengal ineligible for financial assistance from the Centre to repair damaged infrastructure.

Preparedness

Senior government officials conceded that the damage from the deluge could have been averted had the state taken appropriate measures.

"The National Disaster Management Authority always suggests that the districts should be prepared to handle flood-like situations. It is a regular affair and has to be followed before every monsoon," an official said.

Sources in the state disaster management department said no such step had been initiated.

According to norms, the district authorities should have held meetings with block development officers to identify flood prone zones, set up relief centres, arrange for dry food, clothes and other materials.

This apart, the districts should have carried out mock drills of evacuating people and reaching affected areas with relief materials.

The sources said all

such preparedness should have been completed by May in Bengal, where the monsoon hits in the beginning of June.

A senior Nabanna official said the administrations in Murshidabad, Burdwan, Hooghly and Birbhum—the worst affected districts—were busy with the chief minister's review meetings.

"The chief minister had travelled to Murshidabad, Birbhum and Burdwan between May-end and mid-June. It takes at least 15 days to arrange for such meetings," an official said.

Asked about the situation, a block development officer in Birbhum said: "We did not have dry food and boats in our possession... in the first two days. We had trouble reaching the affected areas."

Survey to solve waterlogging problem of Jorhat town

JORHAT, Aug 2: Officials and technical experts from the Water Resources department, Irrigation, Town and Country Planning, district administration and many others, including the members of a senior citizens' body, Jorhat Sachetan Nagarik Mancha, on Saturday started a survey at various localities here in a bid to solve the waterlogging problem in the town.

Some members of the surveyors' team said that during the first day of their visit to some densely-populated municipal areas of the town, they detected some clogged drains and encroachments in some major canals in the town. The water-carrying capacity of several drains in the urban localities has apparently decreased, as a lot of technical

loopholes were left during their construction, a few years ago.

"From the DCB Road area to the location of Central College in Kenduguri we surveyed several drains on Saturday. Technical loopholes are apparent. We are trying to find out some solution for the massive waterlogging problem in the town," said a member of the team.

As the water-carrying capacity of the several drains and major canals and rivulets like Tarajan and Tocklaijan has reduced over the years, the existing drainage system could not carry the large amount of storm-water even from the main-locations of urban Jorhat leading to artificial flooding in several residential localities like Tarajan Kakotygaon, Soladhara, Dorongichuk, Kenduguri, Tarajan Brahmangaon, Rupali Nagar,

Chandan Nagar, Bongalpukhuri, etc.

In the past four weeks, more than 250 residences and several government offices, schools and colleges were reeling under floodwaters as the existing drainage system could not flush out the storm water.

"The survey will continue for some days in different locations. We invited the Jorhat Municipal Board (JMB) to be a part of this surveyors' team. But they did not join, citing the ongoing strike of the municipal workers. A detailed list of area-wise problems along with practical solutions will be submitted to the Deputy Commissioner after completing the survey so that he orders an effective scheme for solving the problem," said an Additional Deputy Commissioner.

However, the flood water in and around Thoubal district sector of Indo-Myanmar road and low-lying areas in capital Imphal, besides its outskirts have also been receding slowly. On the other hand, Morch, the commercial border town about 110 km south of here has been cut off from Imphal since last three days due to a number of landslides along the hill section of Imphal-Moreh route, sources added.

The Manipur irrigation and flood control department has opened flood control rooms while the locals with the help of MLAs have set up many relief camps and medical camps to help the flood-hit villagers.
