



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

Narmada waters more in canals than in farms

THAKARSHIBHAI DAYABHAI Patel does not deny that the Narmada river waters have reached Gujarat's parched Saurashtra region. They are, indeed, irrigating his own and also other farmers' fields in Malod village of Surendranagar district's Wadhwan taluka.

"The issue isn't whether the water has come, but at what cost," says this 30-acre farmer whose village is just a couple of kilometres from the Dhanki-Botad sub-branch canal. There is enough water in this one as well as five other sub-branches — Vallabhipur, Maliya, Limbdi, Dhrangadhra and Morbi — of the Saurashtra Branch Canal (SBC), which, in turn, offtakes from the Narmada Main Canal (NMC) near Kadi in North Gujarat's Mehsana district.


According to Patel, the problem is not with water in the canals or sub-branches, but taking it further to the fields, "for which we have had to shell out money ourselves". He is among the many farmers in Malod and adjoining villages who have installed diesel engines on the bunds of the Botad sub-branch canal, to "lift" and carry the Narmada waters.

A typical Rajkot-made 10-horsepower diesel engine costs around Rs 40,000. It could go up to Rs 55,000 if a 16-hp engine were used, to enable pumping water over a longer distance. But the main investment is in the PVC pipes, through which the pumped water can be conveyed to the fields.

"A standard 8mm pipe comes at Rs 50-55 per foot. Adding digging and underground laying costs takes it to Rs 75. For 1 km, you need about 3,300 feet of pipe, which will cost Rs 2.5 lakh. There are farmers who have installed engines and pipes to carry water to their fields even up to 10 km or more," claims Patel.

The investments are, however, only one part. Even more is the recurring cost. A diesel engine takes about five hours to water a one-acre field of *kapas* (raw un-ginned cotton), while burning 1.5 litres of diesel per hour on an average. Assuming five irrigations for the crop's entire duration, the total fuel cost at current diesel prices of Rs 62 per litre works out to over Rs 2,300 an acre. This is more than half the cost of harvesting ("picking"), which, at Rs 5/kg on an average *kapas* yield of 800 kg, translates into Rs 4,000 an acre.

"We were initially prepared to incur these costs, on top of investing Rs 15-25 lakh on



engines and pipes, only because Narmada water was available and *kapas* rates, too, were Rs 1,100-1,200 per 20-kg. But today, prices are at Rs 850-900 and there is no return on our investments. Narmada has only added to the debts of the *khedut* (farmer)," complains Patel.

Surentranagar, which votes Saturday, is incidentally India's biggest cotton-producing district and seen to have benefited most by the arrival of water from Sardar Sarovar, popularly known as the Narmada dam.

Narendrasinh Rana, a member of the Bharatiya Kisan Sangh's Gujarat state executive body and the RSS-affiliated organisation's former Surentranagar district presi-

dent, blames the problems of Saurashtra's farmers mainly on the poor progress in building the distributaries, minors and sub-minor canals that are supposed to take the Narmada waters to the fields.

The Sardar Sarovar Narmada Nigam Ltd has completed the 458 km-long NMC from the massive dam at Kevadiya in Gujarat's Narmada district to the Rajasthan border the SBC that offtakes from the main canal at about 263 km in Kadi (Mehsana); and all its six sub-branch canals serving the Saurashtra region.

"Whatever work has been done on the distributaries, minors and sub-minors is either incomplete or shoddy. As a result, the burden of last-mile investment has virtually been loaded on to the farmer. The diesel engines you see on the canal bunds are technically illegal. But do the *kheduts* have choice?" Rana points out.

He cites the example of Halvad in Morbi district. This taluka receives Narmada water from three sub-branch canals — Maliya, Dhrangadhra and Morbi — fed by the SBC pumping station at Dhanki in Surentranagar's Lakhtar taluka. "But all the water hardly goes to farmers' fields. Much of it is used by industry or for drinking water supply in urban centres," he adds.

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BJD to disrupt House over Mahanadi row

BHUBANESWAR: Odisha's ruling party Biju Janata Dal has threatened to disrupt the upcoming winter session of Parliament that starts from December 15 after the Centre refused to intervene in a water dispute involving Mahanadi river with Chhattisgarh.

The Navin Patnaik-led party is the fourth largest in Parliament with 28 MPs. It has often supported the BJP on several key bills and issues, creating a rift in the opposition camp. Its support came handy for the BJP in the Rajya Sabha where the BJP-led National Democratic Alliance is still in minority.

The Odisha government appealed to the Supreme Court for a tribunal over the dispute

that began after neighbouring Chhattisgarh started building a barrage on the river that flows through the two states.

The Centre on Wednesday told the SC that "the prayer of the plaintiff (Odisha government) is devoid of any merit... construction of a Tribunal would not be fruitful", leaving the BJD leadership furious.

"This is a political ploy. The BJP-led government at the Centre doesn't want barrage construction work to be delayed in Chhattisgarh. So, a year after we appealed, they said no, giving the Chhattisgarh government precious time to carry on the project," BJD's Lok Sabha leader Bhartruhari Mahata said.

According to Odisha, the new projects disrupt the flow of water to the Hirakud Dam, a major source of irrigation to both the states. Chhattisgarh says the barrages only collect rainwater and do not affect the flow of the river.

The Centre informed the SC on Wednesday that it was not in favour of forming a tribunal under the water disputes act and wants the matter to be amicably settled between the two states.

BJD leaders said they will try

to secure the support from other parties, just as it got in the state, against the Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP) on the issue.

The BJD has found support from its arch rival Congress and erstwhile allies like the Left parties to take on the BJP in the state assembly.

"We are political rivals. We don't want to join hands in politics but for Mahanadi, we will fight together. Our demands are same. We want a tribunal," Congress' Narasingha Mishra, leader of Opposition in Odisha assembly, said. "The committee, which was formed by the Centre to talk to the two states, held two meetings and submitted any further meeting would not be fruitful," Mishra, who recently organised an all-party meeting in Bhubaneswar, added.

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Polavaram blues rock NDA boat

HYDERABAD: When Andhra Pradesh chief minister N Chandrababu Naidu last week accused the central government of creating hurdles in completing the Polavaram project on river Godavari, many were surprised.

Naidu's Telugu Desam Party (TDP) is a constituent of the Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP)-led National Democratic Alliance (NDA) and his criticism was uncharacteristic. However, those in the know say the CM's harsh words were not unexpected. A lot is riding on the ₹58,000-crore project. It will get water for drinking, irrigation and generate power, so Polavaram, and Andhra's new capital Amaravati, are crucial projects for Naidu ahead of the 2019 assembly polls.

But the project is progressing at a snail's pace though Andhra Pradesh has spent ₹12,000 crore in the past 12 years, and Naidu is beginning to lose patience. Declared a national project, the Centre is supposed to bear the entire expense under the AP Reorganisation Act, 2014, including cost escalations and rehabilitation of evacuees, who, as per an estimate, could number 1.8 lakh.

Officials say Naidu is frustrated as the Centre is releasing money only in dribs and drabs. The National Bank for Rural and Agricultural Development is to

extend loans to be repaid by the Centre. So far, ₹1,982 crore has been made available out of the ₹23,814 crore to be given by 2020.

A common complaint heard in the Andhra secretariat corridors is that the Centre is raising a lot of queries before releasing funds.

Union finance minister Arun Jaitley's statement that the Centre would bear the expenditure


only for the irrigation component has also riled up Andhra officials. They also say the Centre has said if the project is not completed by 2018, its grant component will be converted into a loan.

Naidu's efforts to speed up the project by calling for fresh tenders has been stonewalled. The Centre wrote to him in November, arguing against it on the

ground it may lead to litigation and cost overruns. The opposition has stepped in, accusing Naidu of seeking kickbacks.


Andhra officials deny the allegation, but what remains undeniable is the project is in hot water as is TDP-BJP ties. "We've maintained utmost restraint because we are part of NDA. But it is testing our patience," Naidu had said.

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Odisha braces for heavy downpour, squally winds

Weather system to intensify into deep depression in the next 24 hours: Met office

More than 10 districts of Odisha are likely to be lashed by heavy rain, coupled with squally winds, from Friday due to a depression over the Bay of Bengal.

The depression over the southeast Bay of Bengal and its neighbourhood moved northwards at a speed of about 35 kmph during the past six hours and lay centred about 870 km south-east of Gopalpur, the meteorological centre here said.

The system is likely to move north-northwestwards and reach north Andhra Pradesh and south Odisha

coasts around December 9 morning, it said, adding the system is likely to intensify further into a deep depression in the next 24 hours.

Weakening of system

However, there is a probability of slight weakening of the system when it approaches north Andhra Pradesh and south Odisha coasts.

Under its impact, rain or thundershower is likely to occur at some places in coastal districts and Koraput, Gajapati and Malkangiri districts by Friday. Widespread rain is expected in coastal districts and many places in interior districts till Decem-

ber 10, director of local meteorological office, S.C. Sahu said.

Thereafter, heavy rainfall is likely to lash some places in Gajapati, Ganjam, Rayagada, Khorda, Puri, Jagatsinghpur, Kendrapara, Cuttack, Malkangiri and Koraput districts in the subsequent 48 hours.


The meteorological office advised hoisting of Distant Cautionary Signal Number One (DC-1) at Paradip and Gopalpur Ports in Odisha. Squally winds with a speed of 40 to 50 kmph and gusting up to 60 kmph is likely to prevail along and off Odisha coasts till December 10.

Sea condition would be rough to very rough along and off Odisha coasts and fishermen are advised not to venture into sea from December 10.

Rain in West Bengal

The meteorological department forecast heavy rain in the coastal areas of Gangetic West Bengal on Friday owing to formation of a depression in the Bay of Bengal.

The districts of East Midnapore, West Midnapore, South 24 Parganas, North 24 Parganas and Howrah are likely to receive heavy rain on Friday, Regional meteorological director G.K. Das said.

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AoL responsible for damage of Yamuna floodplains: NGT

Use ₹5 crore fine submitted by the foundation for restoration work, green board tells DDA

In a setback to the Art of Living Foundation of spiritual leader Ravi Shankar, the National Green Tribunal on Thursday held it responsible for causing damage and environmental degradation of the Yamuna flood plains by holding a three-day cultural extravaganza last year.

While refusing to impose an additional environment fine on the AoL, which has already deposited Rs 5 crore, the NGT ordered the DDA to use this amount to restore the floodplains and bill the AoL if the cost is more or return to it the balance if the cost is below that amount.

The AoL termed the verdict "erroneous and untenable" and said they would move the Supreme Court against it.

Ordering that the Yamuna riverbed should not be used to hold any cultural activity of this kind in future, the green panel directed the Delhi Development Authority (DDA) to assess the damage caused on floodplains and compute cost of restoration in line with the

recommendations of the expert panel appointed by it.

"We hold and declare that AoL is responsible for causing damage and environmental degradation of the floodplain of river Yamuna limited to the area that was awarded to it by DDA and the State of UP, in terms of the report of the High Powered Committee," the NGT said in its judgement.

The AoL had organised the

World Culture Festival from March 11-13, 2016, on the floodplains and constructed an oval-shaped stage over an area of seven acres.

Noting that the AoL has already deposited Rs 5 crore with the DDA, it said "in the event, the expenditure for that purpose on the portion of the land forming part of Phase-II of the project of DDA is found to be in excess of Rs 5 crore,

DDA would be at liberty to recover the said amount and AoL shall be liable to pay the said amount on demand.


"If finally the expenditure to be incurred on that amount is less than Rs 5 crore, the remaining amount would be refunded by DDA to AoL," a bench headed by NGT Chairperson Justice Swatanter Kumar said. The tribunal rapped the DDA over its failure to maintain the natural features and ecology of the Yamuna floodplains and said it has failed to exercise its statutory duty in consonance with the environmental laws in force.

It, however, refrained from imposing environmental compensation on the DDA on the

ground that it has already planned construction of a bio-diversity park and improvement of floodplains from its own funds.

The bench, also comprising Justice Jawad Rahim and expert member B.S. Sajwan, said that even the Delhi Pollution Control Committee had failed to exercise due caution in granting permission to AoL. It should have considered the request for permission in accordance with environmental laws in force.

Before the pronouncement of the judgement, the NGT was informed that Justice R. Rathore, who had earlier heard the matter, had recused from the bench.



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Cyclone effect: City records highest Dec rain in 50 yrs

Mumbai: Owing to Cyclone Ockhi, the city recorded the highest-ever December rainfall on Tuesday, in just 12 hours. Rainfall during 8.30am-8.30pm at the IMD's Santacruz observatory was 36mm, which beat the previous record of 31.4mm, recorded on December 12, 1967.

As Ockhi came close to the city on Tuesday it brought in a day full of rains and gusty winds, leading to a steep drop in temperatures. The maximum temperatures recorded at both the Santacruz and Colaba observatories were 10 degrees lower than on Monday. As a result, at several places, noon-temperatures

me unusually was much cooler than dawn. Also, there was barely a two-degree difference between maximum and minimum temperatures at most places.

Ockhi's threat had prompted the government to keep schools shut, which lead to an easing of school-time traffic. For adults, it was business as

usual, barring minor absenteeism, though organizations had issued advisories to employees. While rainfall was moderate, rumourmongers were busy creating panic with fake news on the sea link and various roads, prompting the BMC to tweet: "Please don't create panic." In fact, no transport disruption

was reported from anywhere in the city. The trains ran, as did the buses and cars.

All 2,606 boats and other vessels off the state's coast since Saturday have been accounted for, and no fishermen are missing. Passenger boat services, suspended because of Ockhi, are likely to resume on today.

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Ockhi death toll climbs to 36

THIRUVANANTHAPURAM, DEC 7
Three bodies were recovered this morning off the Kerala coast, taking the death toll due to Cyclone Ockhi to 36 even as rescue operations are going on in full swing to trace the 96 missing fishermen.

Sources in the State control room monitoring the rescue operations said with the recovery of three more bodies, the death toll in Kerala due to the cyclone has gone up to 36 and 96 fishermen are yet to be traced.

While a body was recovered near Alappuzha by the Marine enforcement wing, two bodies were found by Coast Guard ship Vaidhavy off Alappuzha-Kochi coast this morning, defence sources said.

An Air Force aircraft AN 32, flying between Kozhikode-Kochi coasts had sighted a fishing boat with about 15 fishermen this morning following which Navy has sent a Dornier aircraft and ship to the area which is close to Lakshadweep islands, the sources said. Meanwhile, shipping services from Kozhikode to Lakshadweep began today with around 60 passengers boarding the high speed vessel from Beypore this morning.

MV Mimicoy, the passenger vessel, berthed at Beypore had suffered some damage in the cyclone following which MMD officials had not
