to last for two more days

CHENNAI: It does seem the dog days are over in the city, finally, thanks to the southwest monsoon. Though the bulk of Chennai's rains are from the northeast monsoon, the city, and its neighbourhood may enjoy please ant weather for two more days as thundershowers that began on Monday are likely to continue.

Chennai woke up to a cloudy Tuesday and by evening several parts of the city had been hit by thundershowers. The rain also brought with it the usual traffic logjams and inundation.

Several areas such as Kilpauk, Anna Nagar, Egmore and Chintadripet were waterlogged as rains lashed these areas relentlessly for nearly an hour in the evening. Motorists had a tough time negotiating traffic on arterial roads such as Second Avenue Anna Nagar, Spurtank Road, Jawaharlal Nehru Salai and Poonamallee High. Corporation authorities said they had undertaken work to remove fallen trees and pump out water from some of the subways in the city.

With a feeble off-shore trough prevailing over the Karnataka and Kerala coast, the meteorological department forecasts that the southwest monsoon is likely to set in by June 9 once the westerly winds gain strength.

Officials of the meteorological department noted that normally, the southwest monsoon, which sets in by June 1, was slightly delayed this time.

Describing Monday night's thunder activity as part of pre-monsoon showers, S. Balachandran, director, Area Cyclone Warning Centre, said showers over parts of the State was more of convective activity triggered by westerly winds.

This weather pattern of isolated rainfall will continue over the State and Chennai will experience thundershowers during the evening or night.

Overnight thundershowers had a drastic effect on the humid weather. Chembarambakkam recorded the highest volume of rainfall with 5 cm and Nungambakkam received 4 cm.

Tuesday's day temperature dropped much below normal and the weather stations in Nungambakkam and Meenambakkam recorded 35.2 degree Celsius and 36 degree Celsius respectively. The meteorological department forecasts the minimum temperature will hover around 27 degree Celsius.

Houses damaged by sea incursion

CHENNAI: A few houses in Pattinapakkam, one of the localities close to shore, were damaged due to seawater incursion following high tide accompanied by strong winds on Tuesday.

Rasapan, a resident of Pattinapakkam fishing hamlet, said the sea was rough and the waves had risen high at night. It had damaged portions of a few houses close to the shore. Delta farmers pin hopes on southwest monsoon

Ryots say robust rains crucial for kuruvai cultivation on three lakh acres

THANJAVUR: Farmers in the Cauvery delta region of the State are pinning their hopes on a good southwest monsoon, which, the met office has forecast, will set in the next couple of days.

Though normally southwest monsoon does not bring huge rainfall directly to the delta, copious rains in Cauvery catchment areas could bring water down the river to fill Karnataka reservoirs and then the Mettur dam.

"The State government has already ruled out opening of Mettur dam on the customary date of June 12 due to poor storage levels. At the same time, Chief Minister Jayalalithaa has laid out ambitious plans to raise kuruvai paddy on three lakh acres in the delta region, uti-

lising sub-surface water for which she has also extended the special kuruvai package to farmers. However, we need to understand that over exploitation of sub-surface water will only harm the fertility of the soil in the longer run.

"So, most of us will prefer a good monsoon that has been forecast. Only rains in the days to come and flow down the Cauvery in time could bring the best out of the kuruvai season," the vice-president of Tamil Nadu Vivasaya Thozhilalar Sangam V. Jeevakumar said.

Overexploitation of subsurface water has already taken a toll on the fertility of soil, especially in the eastern Cauvery delta region where incursion of sea water is also huge problem.

"Overexploitation of subsurface water by those using


borewells for farm operations is hurting our prospects. The State government, which is reaching out to borewell farmers through its kuruvai package, could also think of better water management using rain water. Long-term measures such as permanent water harnessing structures in the course of major irrigation sources is the need of the hour to protect the entire delta region," observes secretary of the Tamil Nadu Vivasayigal Sangam Samy Natarajan.

Stressing that only a decent or beneficial southwest monsoon could help ensure a bountiful kuruvai paddy crop, Mr. Samy Natarajan says rainfall in the weeks ahead and continued flow down the river could help recharge the aquifers and raise the depleting ground water table in the delta.

Monsoon arrives in Kerala with a bang

It will hit city in a day or two

THIRUVANANTHAPURAM: The southwest monsoon set in over Kerala and Lakshadweep on Wednesday, arriving a day after its scheduled onset and bringing with it a steady spell of showers in the southern and central districts of the state.

The India Meteorological Department (IMD) said the monsoon further advanced into the remaining parts of the south Arabian Sea, the Maldives-Comorin region, most parts of Kerala and Tamil Nadu, and some parts of south-interior Karnataka.

The meteorological department also forecast more rains in Bengaluru in the coming days as the monsoon will cover the city and south-interior Karnataka completely in the next 24-48 hours. Until then, it's only pre-monsoon showers.

The IMD said conditions were "favourable" for further advance of the monsoon in Ker-



ala, Tamil Nadu, Karnataka and Andhra Pradesh during the next 48 hours. Weathermen announced the onset based on the conditions, including rainfall monitored in 14 stipulated centres over the past 48 hours.

The IMD had predicted the monsoon's onset on June 7 with a model error of plus or minus four days.

Heavy rains lashed the southern districts of Kerala through Tuesday and Wednesday.

According to the Meteorological Centre in Thiruvananthapuram, 20 stations in the state recorded heavy to very heavy rainfall, with five of them recording rainfall of 10 cm or above. Alappuzha and Chengannur in Alappuzha district (15 cm each), Punalur in Kollam district (13 cm), Cherthala in Alappuzha district (11 cm) and Nedumangad in Thiruvananthapuram district (10 cm) recorded the five best rainfall figures. The Met Centre has predicted heavy rains in parts of the state till Sunday.

One dead in Idukki

The first day of the monsoon season also brought in misery in parts of the state's hilly regions – in Vazhavara in Idukki district, a landslip led to the death of one person, identified as Joby John.

In Thazhathangadi in Kottayam district, a portion of an anganwadi (child care centre) collapsed in the rains. Preliminary reports said disaster was averted because children were shifted out of the building earlier in the day.

The Kerala State Disaster Management Authority (KSD-MA) has directed the Thiruvananthapuram district administration to impose restrictions on tourists at hill stations, including Ponmudi and the coastal regions in the district.





Delhi govt sets up committee tog restore Capital's water bodies

NEW DELHI: The 1,000-odd water bodies of Delhi, including village ponds, marshes, lakes and step wells, may finally get a fresh lease of life.

Delhi chief minister Arvind Kejriwal constituted a high-level committee to look into matters related to water bodies on the National Green Tribunal's orders.

The NGT order came on a petition expressing concern over the depletion of the water table in Delhi.

Chief executive officer of Delhi Parks and Garden Society, SD Singh, told Hindustan Times that over 900 parks had been identified.

"Out of these, more than 300 have water while 400-odd have gone dry. Over 100 have become parks. We have asked authorities concerned to clean them up and, more importantly, maintain

them well," Singh said.

The government-appointed committee will be headed by PWD minister Satyendar Jain. Water minister Kapil Mishra, environment and forests minister Imran Hussain and Delhi Jal Board CEO Keshav Chandra will be part of the committee.

The Delhi government, Delhi Jal Board and the Central Ground Water Authority were to submit a compliance report to the tribunal on or before August 9.

A bench headed by NGT chairperson Swatanter Kumar issued notices to the ministry of environment and forests, ministry of urban development, Delhi government, the Central Ground Water Authority (CGWA), Delhi Development Authority, Delhi Jal Board (DJB) and others while seeking their reply within two weeks.

The committee will look into the matters such as site inspection, proper identification/confirmation of water bodies for updated inventory, suggesting suitable recommendations to restore them, rain water harvesting and a beautification plan.

"It is estimated that on an average, New Delhi receives 611 mm of rainfall on a yearly basis. Therefore, even if 50 per cent of this rainwater is harvested, this may help in easing the burden on regular water supply to some extent...

"It may also help in recharging the depleting water table which is decreasing at an alarming rate due to large scale extraction of ground water, which needs to be compensated through cost-effective and substantially effective implementation of rainwater harvesting techniques," the plea said.

Ken-Betwa project, a threat to wildlife?

NEW DELHI: An ambitious project to link Ken and Betwa rivers has become a stage for a unique man-animal conflict. Proponents of the project, led by the Union Water Ministry, say that the proposed Daudhan dam and the 2.5 km canal — the key structures of the project — that will transfer surplus water from the Uttar Pradesh section of the Ken to the Betwa in Madhya Pradesh are critical to irrigate nearly 7,00,000 hectares in drought-ravaged Bundelkhand.

However, environmentalists say that such a dam will submerge at least 4,000 hectares of Madhya Pradesh's Panna tiger reserve, whose tigers were almost lost to poaching in 2009 and have only recently been partially replenished. They allege that most districts in Madhya Pradesh will not actually get the promised water. There

are vultures in the region, whose nests will be threatened by the height of the dam.

Multi-pronged clearance

Since the project involves clearing forest land, affects endangered animals and involves relocating some farmers, it requires multipronged environmental clearance by the Ministry of Environment Forests and Climate Change. The National Board for Wildlife has constituted a committee of experts, which includes ecologists, hydrologists, representatives from the Water Ministry, and tiger conservationists to study the impact on wildlife. Their go-ahead is essential for the environmental impact assessment and forest clearance by the Madhya Pradesh government. These authorities have given an 'in-principle' clearance but funds for the project — Rs. 9,000 crore — won't be cleared by the Union Cabinet unless all the clearances are in order.

Frustrated by the pace of clearance, Water Resources Minister Uma Bharti earlier this week threatened to "go on an agitation" if there were more hurdles to the wildlife clearance.

'Express pace'

Raman Sukumar, ecologist at the Indian Institute of Science who chairs the NBWL's committee assessing the project, disagreed. He told *The Hindu* that the project was being "processed at an express pace. We were only asked to do it in February and if there's a tiger sanctuary involved it's an exhaustive assessment."



नई दिल्ली, (वार्ता): एक सप्ताह की देरी से आने के बाद दिक्षण-पश्चिम मानसून तेजी से आगे बढ़ता हुआ केरल के शेष हिस्सों, तमिलनाडु, तटीय कर्नाटक के अधिकतर हिस्सों तथा दिक्षणी भीतरी कर्नाटक, रायलसीमा और तटीय आंध्र प्रदेश के कुछ हिस्सों तक पहुंच गया है। मौसम विभाग ने बताया कि मानसून के अगले 48 घंटे में अरब सागर में और आगे बढ़ने, तटीय कर्नाटक के शेष भाग, दिक्षणी कॉकण के कुछ हिस्सों और गोवा, उत्तरी भीतरी कर्नाटक तथा रायलसीमा, तटीय आंध्र प्रदेश और बंगाल की खाड़ी के मध्य में कुछ और हिस्सों में पहुंचने की उम्मीद है। इसके लिए अभी परिस्थितयां अनुकृल हैं। उसने बताया कि शुक्रवार को तटीय तथा दक्षिणी भीतरी कर्नाटक और केरल के कुछ हिस्सों में भारी से बहुत भारी बारिश हो सकती है। इसके अलावा नगालँड, मणिपुर, मिजोरम और त्रिपुरा तथा कॉकण और गोवा में भारी बारिश की संभावना है।
