SYL: State wants water availability assessed T-12

The Punjab Government is ready for talks with Haryana to resolve the river waters dispute, provided the dialogue includes assessing the quantum of water available with the state.

The state also wants that the ratio of division of assets followed after the 1966 reorganisation includes river waters shared between Punjab and Haryana. While all other assets of Punjab were divided in the ratio of 60:40, the state claims that Haryana got more than its share of 40 per cent of the river waters.

Chief Minister Amarinder Singh, who met Prime Minister Narendra Modi in New Delhi this evening, however, did not discuss the issue with the PM. Three days ago, he had Union Water met Resources River and Minister Development Uma Bharti and made the state's stand clear regarding assessing the quantum of river waters available and the drastic fall in the

state's groundwater level.

Sources in the Irrigation Department said the Centre was keen on appeasing Punjab by first getting the Shahpur Kandi dam issue resolved with Jammu and Kashmir. A meeting in this regard was held last week in New Delhi, where officials of the Ministry of Water Resources were also present. A solution is expected within a month, with Punjab set to get 0.78 MAF (million acre foot)) of its water share from the dam.

During the talks with J&K expected later this month, Punjab will cite the latest

flow series to show that the quantum of water has reduced from 17.17 MAF to 13.38 MAF, and there has been an alarming fall in the water table. The groundwater development index (GDI) of the state is two and a half times more than the internationally accepted figure of 75. Each year, Punjab is losing 12 MAF of groundwater, so there is no additional water that the state can part with through the proposed SYL canal. Against the 52 MAF required for agriculture, only 27 per cent is available presently being met from the river waters.

Researchers are developing a cost-effective forecast system using cloud networking & remote sensors

The Ganga may be the focus of the government's river-cleaning efforts, but a group of U.S. researchers is working on a system to map undulating pollution trends in the Godavari, India's second

longest river.

Using a mix of methods, including satellite-monitoring, traversing stretches of the river to collect water samples and using special sensors to measure bacterial and chemical pollution, the researchers are trying to develop a cost-effective forecast system.

The team's long-term objective is to be able to inform State officials and citizens of a probable spike in, say, levels of dangerous microbes or effluents, similar to weather and air pollution forecasts. That apart, said Anup Malani, Professor of the University of Chicago Lav School, it is to be Law able to access "raw data" that could be used to inform the ef-

ficacy of a proposed faecal sludge treatment plant and whether behavioural interventions – including incentives or punishments – to restrict activities that pollute the river could actually work.



These are relayed to a website called Thoreau, a wireless sensing network maintained at the University of Chicago to map parameters, for analysis. Some river attributes such as microbial levels require to be measured in laboratories, though the team hopes eventually to be able to use low-cost sensors that measure them,

"Through cloud-based data collection and real-time mapping systems, the teams intend to demonstrate the importance and value of de-

tecting and anticipating pollutants that enter the river in the form of human waste, organic materials, and chemical contaminants,"

the University of Chicago research team said in a statement.



7 die in Assam floods; lightning kills 32 in Bihar

Met dept predicts more rainfall

NEW DELHI/CHENNAI, DHNS along the NH-415 that links As-AND AGENCIES: Seven perished in the worsening flood situation in Assam on Monday, while lightning strikes claimed 32 lives in Bihar.

The floods, a recurring calamity every year, has impacted nearly 12.25 lakh people in the north-eastern state this year. With the latest casualties. death toll in current floods has touched 33, with seven deaths taking place in the state's largest city of Guwahati.

In the neighbouring Arunachal Pradesh, incessant rain for the past three days triggered landslides and flash floods, claiming the life of a 3year-old girl, who was washed away on Sunday.

Major rivers in the state are flowing above the danger level, while surface communication was disrupted at many places sam with Arunachal Pradesh, officials said. The Met department predicted more rainfall over the next few days.

Bihar's Disaster Management Department Principal Secretary Pratyay Amrit told PTI that the 32 deaths due to lightning include four in state capital Patna. The death toll

was 16 on Sunday.

The hardest-hit districts of Rohtas and Vaishali have reported five deaths each, he said." Bihar has been receiving intermittent rain over the past few

Amrit said the state government would soon launch a lightning-tracker app to alert people on thunder and light-

Heavy rain lashed many places in Uttar Pradesh, causing a rise in water levels in major rivers like Ganga. Ghaghra

and Sharda rivers are flowing above danger levels in some places

Birdghat (Gorakhpur) recorded 130.4 mm, Basti 90 mm and Mahrajganj 78.2 mm rainfall on Monday, a Central Water Commission report said.

The Met office in the state said light to moderate rain or thundershowers have occurred at many places in the eastern region and at a few places in the western districts

Heavy rain triggered landslides in the interior areas of Mandi and Kangra in Himachal Pradesh, though all major highways are open to

Local MeT office predicted heavy rain at isolated places in mid and lower hills of Kangra, Mandi, Sirmaur, Shimla, Solan and Bilaspur on July 11, adding that the wet spell would continue for six days till July 15.

Modi takes stock of State flood scene

GUWAHATI, July 9: Prime Minister Narendra Modi today called up Chief Minister Sarbananda Sonowal over phone from New Delhi and took stock of the prevailing flood situation in the State even as the overall death toll in the current wave of flood shot up to 24, with one more death being reported from Karinganj.

Sonowal informed the Prime Minister about the government's effective and expeditious measures to reach out to the affected people.

He also informed that already Ministers of his cabinet have been directed to rush to affected areas to take stock of flood situation and step up relief and rescue operations ensuring proper arrangement of facilities for flood affected and relief camp inmates.

The Chief Minister also apprised that

the MPs and the MLAs of the respective flood-affected areas have also been asked to remain in their constituencies and supervise rescue and relief operations.

Centre advisory SPL CORRESPONDENT

NEW DELHI, July 9: The Centre today issued an advisory warning in view of the forecast of heavy to very heavy rainfall in Assam and its adjoining states for the next two to three days, even as the Brahmaputra river and its tributaries were rising rapidly.

Official sources here said that heavy to very heavy rainfall will occur in Arunachal Pradesh, Assam, North Bengal, Sikkim and parts of Bhutan in the next two to three days because of active southwest monsoon conditions.

However, the overall flood scenario did show some improvement for the second consecutive day with the number of affected districts coming down to 15 from vesterday's 19.

As per the official flood bulletin, the flood-affected districts are Lakhimpur, Jorhat, Golaghat, Cachar, Dhemaji, Biswanath, Karimganj, Sonitpur, Majuli, Barpeta, Nagaon, Nalbari, Sivasagar, Morigaon and Chirang.

"As on today, 4,86,726 people in 1,096 villages stand affected," the flood bulletin stated, adding that a crop area of 41239.19 hectares too remain submerged.

The Brahmaputra was still flowing above its danger level at Neamatighat. Tezpur, Dibrugarh, Goalpara and Dhubri while its tributaries Dhansiri and Jia Bharali are also maintaining identical trends, besides Siang, Dikhow and Khusiyara.

The relief operation has also been intensified with the number of relief camps (eight districts) going up from 89 to \$90, housing 17,744 inmates compared to yesterday's figure of 16,705. Further, 90 relief distribution centres are available for the flood-affected people.

Prime Minister Narendra Modi inquired about the measures taken by the State Government and said that the Centre is taking the problem of flood and erosion in Assam very seriously. He assured that the Union Government would extend all support to the State government for tackling the situation.

Over 15 lakh hit in Assam flood

GUWAHATI, JULY 11

Over 15.18 lakh people have been affected so far by the current wave of floods that have inundated vast areas in 23 districts in Assam.

Many rain-fed rivers, including the Brahmaputra, are flowing above the danger mark. More than 49,000 displaced people have taken shelter in 115 relief camps. Governor Banwarilal Purohit today visited flood-affected Nagaon district and asked the Deputy Commissioner and the police to provide medical facilities and security to those living in the relief camps.

Lakhimpur district remains as the worst-hit where more than 3.10 lakh people have been affected. The crop area affected by the flood is 1,40,837.42 hectare.

14 feared dead in Arunachal

GUWAHATI, JULY 11

At least 14 persons are feared to have died in a massive landslide triggered by flash-flood caused incessant rains in Papum Pare district of Arunachal Pradesh on Tuesday. Eight houses were wiped out by the landslide and inmates were buried alive, a district official said.

Chief Minister Pema Khandu has put the district administration on alert and ordered an urgent rescue operation to evacuate probable survivors trapped in the debris. A 35-member NDRF team is carrying out rescue operations along with volunteers in the land-slide-hit area. — TNS

Twenty villages face submergence

Fasting farmers in Narmada valley say will vacate villages only when proper rehabilitation is provided


BARWANI (MADHYA PRADESH)

Farmers from 20 villages of the Narmada valley have gone on a fast in protest against the administration's instructions to vacate villages that are in the submergence zone of the Sardar Sarovar Dam.

After getting permission from the Narmada Control Authority to close the floodgates of the Sardar Sarovar dam, the Gujarat government has closed all 30 gates of the dam, causing the water level to rise to 133 metres from 122 metres.

This is expected to generate hydel power, water fields and take drinking water to parts of Gujarat. But the raised level also brings many villages in the submergence zone, necessitating their abandonment.

"There is at present a relay hunger strike. About 200 people across 20 villages are fasting each day to make the

point that they do not want to abandon their villages," said Rahul Yadav of the Narmada Bachao Andolan. "They want rehabilitation at a place that has facilities like their villages, and not land that does not have basic

"The Supreme Court had said that the villages concerned should be vacated by the end of the month. Rehabilitation has been offered

to them and officials have visited the sites and expressed satisfaction with the facilities offered," Barwani PRO Swadesh Silawat told The Hindu over phone.

The villages that are wit-

ness fasts include Bagud, Picchodi, Avalda, Chikhalda, Kadmal, Kharparkheda, Bajararkheda, Nisarpur, Kothada, Karodia, Bodh-Nisarpur, wada, Gopalpura, Gangali, Kavathi, Ekalbara, Semalda, and Parkhed.


'The government is asking us to leave our villages but it has not provided proper rehabilitation yet. We will vacate our villages only when the government provides proper rehabilitation with basic facilities," Mr. Yaday said.

As The Hindu had reported a few days back from Barda in Barwani, villagers complained that they had been allotted land 7 km away from their villages, which was not easily accessible from their fields that were outside the submergence zone. Also, about 70 families had not been surveyed, villagers claimed, meaning that they had not got any altern-
