More sultry days, rainy nights for city

CHENNAI: On Monday, residents of several areas woke up to flooded roads due to heavy overnight showers. There are indications that for another two days, city residents will experience sultry weather during the day and rains during the

During the day, temperature is likely to rise above the average and there may be thundershowers late at night. S. R. Ramanan, Director of Area Cyclone Warning Centre, said that such convective rains immediately after many hot days are normal during September. He added that isolated rains would be experienced across Tamil Nadu and that there might be an increase in rainfall by Friday or Saturday.

Pointing out that Tiruttani received the highest volume of rainfall of 13 cm, he said a few other places would also get heavy showers because of the convective activity. "It will bring scattered rainfall in one place or other. Many places around the city received between 1 cm and 4 cm of rainfall on Sunday night," he added.

The rainfall has helped the city touch its average share of rains for the season. Chennai has registered 41 cm of rainfall, which is excess by 1 cm since June 1. Similarly, Mee-

Preparing for the climate exiles

The poorest and most vulnerable people, forced to move as result of climate change, will have no legal standing under the United Nations Refugee Convention

Although firm numbers are not available, reports suggest that more than 4,00,000 people have arrived at the European Union (EU) border so far this year, driven by wars and conflicts in places such as Syria, Afghanistan and Eritrea. In recent weeks, we have watched in horror the images of officers firing water cannons and tear gas at desperate crowds at borders and railway stations, of people struggling ashore on small dinghies, and of children who could not make it across.

One hopes that these pictures are not a glimpse into a future with climate change impacts and the resulting conflicts. Disasters such as intense storms and heat waves and slow moving changes like droughts and sea level rise (SLR) are expected to exacerbate living conditions to such an extent that people could be forced to move from their homes and become climate exiles. Many may be forced to move into neighbouring, more protective spaces in the same country or perhaps across national borders. According to the 2006 Stern Review, climate change may displace 200 million people by the middle of the century

Island Nations

Consider, for example, atoll nations in the Pacific such as Tuvalu or the Maldives in the Indian Ocean. With an elevation of only a few metres above sea level, these islands will suffer the worst effects of storms and flooding and may be partly or entirely submerged by even a couple of metres of SLR. While the population of these small island states is relatively small, people will have to leave their country without a viable nation state. Those forced to move in this manner have no legal standing under the United Nations Refugee Convention, which offers protection only for those who have been forced to leave their country owing to "well-grounded fear of being persecuted for reasons of race, religion, nationality, membership in a particular social group or political opinion."

Worst of all, the people most affected by these changes will be among the poorest and most vulnerable. Their own nations' contributions to greenhouse gas (GHG) concentrations in the atmosphere are relatively trivial, but they would suffer some of the most severe effects. It is no surprise then that Alliance of Small Island States (AOSIS) has called for global action to limit warming to 1.5°C, as opposed to the general focus on a 2°C limit. In a grim reminder of reality, however, the World Bank in its report "Turn Down the Heat" says that without action, we could be seeing warming by 4°C above

pre-industrial levels.

Low-lying delta regions of the world such as those of the Irrawaddy and the Ganges-Brahmaputra are also vulnerable to the effects of SLR. More than a tenth of

of the world that are within 10 metres of today's sea level, also known as Low Elevation Coastal Zones (LECZ). Close to half of Bangladesh lies in the LECZ and these areas will be severely affected by rising seas.

Anticipating these changes with rising temperature, it is important that we prepare to address these issues instead of building fortress-like nations. Regional agreements, joint action, training and skills, sharing of knowledge, technologies, lessons from successes and failures to adapt should all be part of a regional focus in preparing for SLR. Labour agreements are especially important and should be combined with skill building and training in advance of migration.

Loss and damage

The United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change (UNFCCC) has acknowledged a domain referred to as Loss and Damage (L&D), which essentially tries to capture these types of inability to cope with the effects of warming. This is distinct from mitigation, or reducing greenhouse gas emissions, and adaptation, or finding ways to live in a warmer world. At the Conference of Parties (COP19) of the UNFCCC, held in Warsaw in 2013, all parties agreed to set up a new mechanism on L&D. The issue is important because even after GHG emissions are reduced and commu-

would still be loss and damage to people, livelihoods and infrastructure as a result of their inability to cope with climate change. Loss generally refers to the complete forfeiture of items like land, ecosystems, or of human lives, while damage refers to the harm to infrastructure and property that could be repaired. The term includes both economic and non-

In order to gain traction, however, this issue needs support from rich countries (Annex-1 countries in UN parlance). The term L&D has, at any rate, come to imply liability and compensation, which makes it particularly challenging for rich countries, which are responsible for the bulk of the GHG concentrations in the atmosphere. It is still not clear if L&D will figure at all in the negotiations and whether it would then be part of the core

The Loss and Damage mechanism is ufor review in 2016 and developing courtries want to ensure that it is part of the core agreement in Paris, so that its certrality is established. This is why developing countries "are fighting tooth an nail to ensure L&D figures in the coagreement", said Indrajit Bose from Third World Network.

Commentators on a recently concluded meeting in Bonn, a preparatory meeting for the Paris COP, have said progres was slow but others contend that various issues will get trimmed down as discussions move forward and the focus with the work matters. With less that three months remaining to decide the questions, time is running out.

The refugee crisis in Europe reminus that the Paris agreement needs to wider than just the reduction of gree house gases, or mitigation. The text of the recently concluded meeting of Li Minded Developing Countries in Del states that the issues for the Paris Coare "mitigation, adaptation, finance, opacity building, technology developme and transfer, transparency of action as support as well as loss and damage." A knowledging and acting on these issue would help prevent the kind of crisis are now seeing in Europe in future as result of climate change.

Artificial flood throws life out of gear

GUWAHATI, Sept 20: A torrential downpour for about two hours this morning left many localities in the city reeling under artificial flood.

Besides the low-lying localities of Anil Nagar,

Nabin Nagar, Tarun Nagar, Rajgarh and RG Baruah Road, other places like Panjabari, Down Town, Sarumataria, Japorigog, Dispur, MLA Hostel and Geetanagar also witnessed massive water-logging.

Traffic along the RG Baruah Road was halted for many hours as water-level in the road went up alarmingly. Traffic police diverted vehicles to other thoroughfares.

At the Assam State Zoo a guard wall collapsed, flooding many houses.

Water also entered residential compounds at many places in Nabin Nagar, Anil Nagar, Panjabari and other localities.

"The situation in our locali-

ty is pretty bad. The entire locality is submerged. Water has entered many houses, including my own, People are unable to go out anywhere. Life has come to a complete standstill," said Dwip Baruah, president of the Nabin Nagar Welfare Society.

He added, "The situation would have been more chaotic if it had not been a weekend."

Baruah said that despite repeated meetings with senior officials, including Chief Minister Tarun Gogoi, by local residents' committees, the district administration, GMDA and GMC had failed to take concrete steps to deal with the problem of artificial floods in Guwahati.

"Mere short-term measures are not enough. The Bahini river has to be diverted on an urgent basis and digging of Silsako Beel, Deepor Beel and Bharalu river has to be carried out to increase their retaining capacity," he said.

"We are unable to go out. The RG Baruah Road is closed. The administration needs to take measures on a war-footing to ensure that repeated flooding in Guwahati does not take place. The drainage system has to be improved," Bhattacharjee said.

Cycle-rickshaw pullers along the RG Baruah Road and other localities made fortunes by ferrying peo-

ple through flooded streets by charging many times over the usual rates.

Meanwhile, the district administration said that the rainfall today was to the tune of 80 mm within the first half an hour, covering the greater Guwahati area.

Kamrup Metro DC Dr M Angamuthu said that all circle officers have been directed to assess the damage covering roads, bridges and guard walls.

"The Water Resources Department has been asked to check all the riverside bunds and critical embankments and the PWD has been directed to checks the roads and undertake immediate restoration work, if needed," he said.

RB Barua, Additional DC, said that pumps are working round-the-clock to release water from the flooded localities into the Bharalu and Brahmaputra rivers. "SDRF personnel have been deployed at many places to ensure that no untoward incidents

take place. They have boats at their disposal. Water has started receding and by 10 pm we expect the situation to be back to normal," Barua said.

A rarity: September snow in Gulmarg

Incessant rain over the past 24 hours has brought down the mercury and caused winter's chill in Kashmir today as several high altitude places like the Gulmarg meadow resort received a rare autumn snow.

The rain lashed most areas of the Kashmir valley causing a considerable drop in the

temperature, while Gulmarg, where the higher reaches of the Afarwat mountains received mild snowfall, recorded the day's maximum of 8.0°C, the lowest in the region.

An official of the state Meteorological Department said the maximum temperature in Srinagar city was recorded at 15.2°C, a drop of 10 degrees from the yesterday's maximum temperature.

"Rain has been received at almost all places, while snow was received in the higher reaches of Gulmarg at Afarwat," the official said.

Srinagar city received incessant rain during the day.

There were reports of snowfall at several other high altitude places like the Simthan Top in south Kashmir, but the Met Department said it had no observatory there and could not confirm it. इस साल दिल्ली और आसपास के इलाकों में सितंबर में काफी कम बारिश हुई है। दिल्ली में इस महीने में दो दिन में करीब 30 मिमी बारिश हुई है। मौसम वैज्ञानिकों ने बताया कि पिछले तीन सालों में 22 सितंबर तक इतनी कम बारिश नहीं हुई थी। इससे पहले, साल 2012 में 55.2 मिमी बारिश सितंबर में हुई थी। मॉनसून कमजोर होने से लोगों को गर्मी महसूस हो रही है।

मंगलवार को मौसम वैज्ञानिकों ने बारिश की संभावना जताई थी, लेकिन बारिश नहीं हुई। दिन भर धूप और उमस ने लोगों को परेशान किया। मौसम को बदलने वाली चक्रवाती हवाएं शिफ्ट नहीं हुईं, जिससे बारिश नहीं हो पाई। पहले इन्हीं हवाओं

Day-old link canal breaches

Naidu's ambitious Godavari-Krishna link project comes a cropper

HYDERABAD, DHNS: The much publicised interlinking of Godavari with Krishna rivers took a severe beating when an aqueduct built on Tammileru river stream to carry 80 tmc water to Krishna delta suffered a major breach, on Sunday.

The work on the Polavaram Right Canal, which is a part of the Godavari-Krishna link, was completed within a short period of six months. Water from Godavari river was on Friday released from Pattiseema through lift irrigation. But, the canal breached at Thammileru aqueduct on Saturday evening.

Though only one of the 12 pumps of the lift irrigation project was functioning, the breach has put state Irrigation minister Devineni Umamaheswara Rao's future in jeopardy.

According to experts, about 15 to 20 feet lining of the hurriedly built aqueduct breached within a day after irrigation minister Umamaheswara Rao formally switched on the pump, which has the capacity of pumping 354 cusecs water.

However, the rain water from catchment areas raised the quantum of water to almost 3,000 cusecs, exerting tremendous pressure on the weak lining. The gap between canal and the aqueduct was not filled and that could be the reason for the breach.

It is ironical that the entire concrete work was completed within 30 days so that the chief minister could declare the interlinking on September 16.

The water, which was supposed to enter Polavaram right canal and then to Krishna delta, has gushed into Kolleru Lake instead.

As the residents of Janampet village in Pedavegi mandal in close proximity to the pump house raised alarm, the authorities have shut down the pump but the damage was already done. People in nearby Eluru city and villages are a worried that a breach of this kind when all the 12 pumps are in full force pumping 8,500 cusecs of water, could wash away a major chunk of the habitations on its path.



Retreating rain lifts govt hopes of 5% rise in rabi crop output

NEW DELHI, SEPTEMBER 22 Good rainfall in the past one week has raised the hopes of the government to improve the foodgrain production in the rabi season. The government believes that despite deficient monsoon the country's foodgrain production could rise by over five per cent to nearly 133 million tonnes (MT) in the coming rabi season.

Agriculture Minister Radha Mohan Singh today said the government was expecting a higher foodgrain output in the rabi season than last year despite less rainfall.

"In the last one week or so, there has been a good rainfall in the rain deficient states, so we have set an ambitious target of 132.78 MT (of foodgrain production) in the rabi season this year," he said. The monsoon deficit so far was 14 per cent, the minister said.

According to the fourth advance estimate released last month, the foodgrain production from rabi (winter) crops in 2014-15 crop year was estimated at 126.38 MT, though the Centre had set a target of 130.75 MT of foodgrain production. The sowing of rabi

crops starts in the first week of October and its harvesting begins in last week of March. The production of wheat — the main Rabi crop — is estimated to have declined to 88.94 MT in 2014-15 crop year as against a record 95.85 MT achieved in the previous season.

The government recently projected the country's total foodgrain production to drop by 1.78 per cent to 124.05 MT in the 2015-16 kharif (summer) season on the back of poor monsoon and a drought-like situation in some states. The country's total foodgrain production is estimated to have declined by 4.66 per cent to 252.68 MT in 2014-15 crop year owing to poor monsoon and

unseasonal rains in February and March.

The country had registered a record foodgrain production of 265.04 MT in 2013-14 crop year.

Regarding the steps taken by the government to minimise the effects of deficient rainfall, Singh said to compensate farmers in the event of delay and deficient rainfall, enhanced seed subsidy was provided for oilseed crops. "The subsidy went up from Rs 1,200 to Rs 1,800 per quintal in case of normal varieties and from Rs 2,500 to Rs 2,700 per quintal for hybrid varieties of oil seeds," he said.

To address the needs of drought-affected areas, the government has announced the implementation of diesel subsidy scheme for crops irrigation with an allocation of Rs 100 crore, he said.

To check rising imports and prices, Singh said the government was concentrating promoting rabi pulses through National Food Security Mission (NFSM). "The NFSMpulses is being implemented in 622 districts of 27 states, including hill and north-eastern states to promote the cultivation of pulses," he said, adding that an outlay of Rs 440 crore has also been proposed to raise the output of pulses.

Likewise in oilseeds, he suggested replacing low vielding wheat area with mustard to help reduce the dependency on import and also provide better returns to farmers.
