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Don't politicise water, give Delhi its rightful share: AAP

MLAs Protest At Haryana Bhavan; SC To Hear Case Tomorrow

New Delhi: Besides taking on Haryana in the Supreme Court, where the matter will be heard on Monday, the Aam Aadmi Party decided on direct action to press the neighbouring state on releasing the capital's "rightful share of water". On Saturday, several AAP MLAs marched to the state's outpost, Harvana Bhavan, on Copernicus Marg and asked the BJP government in Haryana "not to politicise the issue of water supply".

The protests will continue till Haryana increases the amount of water being sent to Delhi, asserted Dinesh Mohaniva, vice-chairman of Delhi Jal Board and MLA from Sangam Vihar. "Water sharing agreements between states are based on the principle that river water is a national resource. In the case of Delhi, a Supreme Court judgment even specifies that the pondage level at Wazirabad reservoir should not fall below 674.5ft in any circumstance," he said.

With water at Wazirabad currently at 669ft, and with no respite after taking the problem to the National Green Tribunal and Delhi high court, hundreds of demonstrators besieged Haryana Bhavan carrying banners asking the Manohar Lal Khattar government in Haryana play politics with the water supply. Around a dozen ruling party MLAs, including Sanjeev Jha, Shiv Charan Go-

el, Anil Bajpeyi, Gulab Singh, Alka Lamba, Commando Surender Singh and Madan Lal. participated in the protest.

Jha, MLA from Burari, alleged that the Haryana government's act was politically motivated, while Lal, MLA from Kasturba Nagar, elaborated, "BJP is seeking revenge on Delhi's people for not having voted it to power in Delhi." Claiming that Haryana's chief secretary had

admitted to lapses leading to water being polluted, a Delhi government spokesperson said, "The water crisis in Delhi is serious, proved by the recent death of a citizen over a dispute related to water. The Haryana government is directly responsible for creating this artificial shortage. and the reasons are not so much administrative as they are political."

With the AAP government approaching the second half of its tenure, water has assumed a bigger importance in the scheme of things. Deputy CM Manish Sisodia announced a 19.9% hike in Delhi Jal Board's allocation in the Budget and declared that the government would improve the water infrastructure and plug all leaks by the yearend. Critically, noting that in all these years, despite being a waterstressed state, Delhi had no idea where almost half the water it supplied went to, the government announced timebound programme to set up water audits at supply points and serviced localities.

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'Haryana not obeying SC order on Yamuna water'

Govt Tells Court Not Getting Enough Drinking Water

New Delhi: The AAP government hedded by Arvind Kejriwal moved the Supreme Court on Friday and accused Haryana of disobeying the apex court's 1996 order directing the state to release 450 cusecs of Yamuna water daily to Delhi for drinking purposes.

In its urgent application drafted for Delhi Jal Board (DJB) by senior advocate Parag Tripathi, the AAP government said it was seeking "most urgent interim directions for supply of 450 cusecs of water in Yamuna river to Delhi at Wazirabad reservoir for drinking water purposes to Delhi, which is in the midst of an acute water crisis owing to stoppage of supply of water by Haryana".

"Haryana is defying the Supreme Court's directions to supply drinking water at Wazirabad reservoir and is taking undue advantage of being an upper riparian state. It has converted

Yamuna in Delhi into a dry river having virtually no water and consequently no water is available for treatment at Wazirabad." the DJB said.

The DJB requested the SC to direct Haryana to "ensure daily supply at least 450 cusecs of potable water at Wazirabad carriage reservoir and to keep it full at all times and have a daily monitoring of water quantity and qu-

ality at Wazirabad barrage/reservoir by an independent agency". Tripathi is likely to mention the application for urgent hearing before CJI Dipak Misra on Monday.

Yamuna water sharing between Delhi and Haryana has been a contentious issue for decades and the SC had ordered Haryana to release 450 cusecs of water to Delhi way back in February 1996.

In February 2016, there was again a tussle between the two govern-

ments over damage to Munak canal that also supplies water to Delhi. While Haryana had promised to repair it on a war footing and the Army had to step in to protect it from quota agitators, the SC had advised political parties running the two states to work together rather than score political points.

In April 2015, Haryana government had moved a plea in Delhi High Court accusing the DJB of wasting water by not opening the gates of its twin pipelines connecting Munak canal to the Wazirabad water treatment plant. The state had also contended that the Delhi HC did not have the jurisdiction to go into the matter of inter-state water disputes as well as interpret inter-state agreements and their implementation.

The DJB too had moved a plea seeking to restrain Haryana's irrigation department from connecting the older Delhi sub-branch canal with the new Munak canal.

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Central body may oversee Cauvery water distribution

ISSUE Ministry of water resources prepares draft cabinet note on its formation

NEW DELHI: Even as Tamil Nadu and Karnataka fight over formation of the Cauvery Management Board (CMB), the ministry of water resources has prepared a draft cabinet note suggesting the formation of a centrally managed authority to oversee release of water to states in Cauvery basin.

Butthe note, which is likely to be sent to the cabinet, has not insisted on the nomenclature of the Cauvery Management Board.

An official privy to the development said that the Centre has no "option" but to form an authority managed by the government.

The government hadargued in Supreme Court that Section 6A of the 1956 Act, by employing the word "may", has left room for discretion to the Central government for the purpose of framing a scheme. However, the SC in its judgment "repelled the submission", saying that the "framing of the scheme is exclusively meant for implementation of the award or as the same gets modified by this court".

The official cited above said that the authority is likely to be headed by an "independent member"... who can be an IAS officer, a technocrat, and not necessarily a chief engineer as suggested by

the Cauvery Water Disputes Tribunal.

The authority is likely to have five full-time members, including the chairman and four other experts appointed by the Centre. The representatives of the four states are likely to be "part-time members".

The CMB was to consist of a full-time chairman and two members to be appointed by the Centre. According to the tribunal, the chairman was to be an irrigation engineer of the rank of chief engineer with not less than 20 years of experience in water resources management. Of the two full-time members, one was to be an irriga-

tion engineer not below the rank of chief engineer and another an agricultural expert. The CMB also included two part-time members nominated by the Centre besides representatives of the states.

The above official, however, refused to give a timeline for setting up of the authority, suggesting that the "implementation of the court order might not meet the March 29 deadline".

"The court order has come in 2007 and is being implemented now. Nothing will change if we don't form the board within the deadline set up by the Supreme Court," said the official.

While Kerala has sought a review on the rejection of its stand of "seeking trans-basin diversion of the allocated 30 tmcft of water for hydropower projects", the Karnataka government, which is against the formation of the CMB, has decided not to file a review petition regarding the verdict. Karnataka feels the formation of the CMB will lead to the state losing control over its waters.

Instead of the CMB, Karnataka has sought the formation of Cauvery Decision Implementation Committee (CDIC). The state's proposal says CDIC will have six members to be headed by the Union water resource ministry and another 11 members of a monitoring agency under it.

On February 16, the Supreme Court awarded Karnataka an additional 14.75 tmcft of water on account of providing Bengaluru 4.75 tmc ft of water for drinking water. Karnataka's allocation stands at 284.75 tmc ft.

Tamil Nadu, despite reduction in its water share, has insisted on formation of the board as the state is against Karnataka's proposal of controlling the release of water. The sharing of the Cauvery water is a sensitive political issue in both states and Karnataka, which saw one of its worst droughts in 2017, goes to polls in the next few months.

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NEAR IMPHAL, HOPE FLOATS FOR POLLUTED NORTHEAST LAKES

"LET'S SAY, the lake has not been to the ICU as yet," Dinabandhu Sahoo, seated in a custom-made blue boat on Loktak Lake, over 50 km from Imphal. "But why wait for that to happen? It's better to take a precautionary step.

Sahoo is the director of the Institute of Bioresources and

Sustainable Development (IBSD) in Manipur, Funded by the Department of Biotechnology, the 'Floating Laboratory' he is seated in is part of a larger network to monitor the health of water bodies in the Northeast.

It's also a first in a major initiative that could be replicated across the region to monitor the rising pollution in its water bodies (see box, page 2) and put in place preventive measures.

The next stop is the Brahmaputra river, which see 'floating B4 boats' cruising over it. The Brahmaputra Biodiversity and Biology Boat, B4, will take the shape of a "large barge" set up on the river with a well-equipped lab including cold storage facilities for holding samples, along with multiple satellite boats or rafts that will venture into shallower and narrower parts of the river to lift samples. The department had announced an initial investment of Rs

50 crore for the project.
The floating lab on Loktak Lake is like a satellite boat that travel across to 15 different spots, picking up water samples to test for a series of parameters. It is a lowbudget, low-cost initiative for now.

Speaking to The Indian Express, DBT senior advisor T Madhan Mohan said, "The idea was to float a large boat that will serve as a place to conduct experiments and research on the Brahmaputra, and address problems that affect the aquatic life. What we see on Loktak is to check water quality and the excessive growth of biomass that

can affect the health of the lake."

Back at Loktak, Sahoo explains the threat to the lake. The striking tourist attraction has over the years begun to exhibit the strains of being the dump-yard of a feet urbanising state capital. of a fast urbanising state capital. "Untreated sewage and chemical waste from the nearby paddy fields has led to the increase of biomass in the lake: from normal to excessive levels," he says.

In other words, pollution levels if it goes unchecked at the lake, which is a natural catchment for rainwater, could have dire consequences. With cascading effects on the health of people who live on the unique "floating islands" or phumdis, the aquatic life and wildlife, people's livelihoods and the fowl smell that it could lead to might potentially keep away the large number of tourists that the lake attracts.

"Much of the focus is on carbon dioxide levels in water bodies, but nitrogen is fast catching up as a significant pollutant," says Sahoo, adding that is beginning to show its effects on Loktak's aquatic life. At the dock, from where boats leave carrying vis-



Meanwhile, work on clearing up the debris and wild growth on the controversial Taj Heritage Corridor, sandwiched between the Taj Mahal and the Agra Fort, began two days ago.

"The ASI plans to green up the entire 20 hectares of reclaimed riverbed which will improve the ambience and help control air pollution," an official said.

The corridor project was the brainchild of former Chief Minister Mayawati. A Supreme Court order in 2003 stopped work on the project and is believed to have led to the fall of the Mayawati government.

ally for Rivers, launched last year as a movement to rejuvenate India's rivers through riverside plantation, has entered the implementation phase with two states, Maharashtra and Karnataka, coming on board by taking multiple measures and creating a template for similar action elsewhere.

Since the support of farmers will be an integral part of saving rivers, the Sadhguruled Isha Foundation is now preparing a separate proposal on agriculture, with detailed solutions to address the farm crisis.

Speaking to TOI, Sadhguru said the proposal would be "revolutionary" and emphasised the need for farmers to move away from a 'subsistence farming mindset' to a 'professional approach' by joining hands—an aim that can be achieved by empowering farmer producer organisations (FPOs).

"There will be no market competence of any kind without scale. Scale is needed and that's why FPO is most important. It can get farmers better price for their produce and even help them get inputs (water for irrigation, fertilisers, seeds) at lower prices," said Sadhguru.

Elaborating on specific points, he said, "We want the government to have a nodal agency to handle and empower FPOs like we have the National Dairy Development Board



आप विधायकों ने हरियाणा सरकार पर लगाया समझौते के उल्लंघन का आरोप

हरियाणा से हक का पानी नहीं मिलने पर आम आदमी पार्टी के विधायकों ने दिल्ली स्थित हरियाणा भवन पर विरोध प्रदर्शन किया। उनका कहना था कि हरियाणा कई महीनों से दिल्ली को पानी नहीं मिलने से राजधानी की जनता को पानी नहीं मिल रहा है और दिल्ली प्यासी है।

दिल्ली और हरियाणा के बीच पानी को लेकर जो समझौता हुआ है, उसका पालन हरियाणा सरकार नहीं कर रही है। यमुना के पानी को लेकर सुप्रीम राज्य यमुना नदी के माध्यम से एक तय कोर्ट के आदेश का पालन भी नहीं किया जा रहा है। उन्होंने कहा कि यह राजनीति से प्रेरित है और यह दिल्ली

की जनता के साथ बीजेपी सरकार के सौतेले व्यवहार को भी साबित कर रहा है। विधायक मदन लाल ने कहा कि गर्मी शुरू हो चुकी है और पानी की डिमांड पहले के मुकाबले बढ़ने वाली है। लेकिन हरियाणा सरकार दिल्ली की जनता के साथ राजनीति कर रही है, जो ठीक नहीं है। आप नेताओं का कहना है कि सभी राज्यों के बीच पानी को लेकर समझौता होता है, क्योंकि देश विधायक संजीव झा ने कहा कि की नदियों के पानी पर समुचे देश का हक है।

यम्ना नदीं में दिल्ली के वजीराबाद जलाशय को देनी होती है जिसे हरियाणा की तरफ से नहीं दिया जा रहा है। हरियाणा की ओर से यमुना नदी में दिल्ली की ओर बेहद कम मात्रा में पानी छोड़ा जा रहा है। इसकी वजह से यमुना नदी में कई जगह इतना कम पानी है कि पैदल ही नदी को पार किया जा सकता है। उन्होंने कहा कि कई महीनों से यमुना नदी में हरियाणा की तरफ से अमोनिया की मात्रा बढ़ रही थी तो दिल्ली सरकार इस मामले को लेकर एनजीटी में गई थी, पानीपत की कुछ इंडस्ट्रीज की तरफ से पानी में अमोनिया छोड़ा जा रहा था। इससे यह पानी पीने के लायक नहीं था। मुख्य सचिव ने इस बात को स्वीकारा और एनजीटी के ऑर्डर पर पानी की गुणवता तो ठीक कर दी गई लेकिन अब पानी की मात्रा में हरियाणा की तरफ से जानवूझकर कमी की गई है जिससे

दिल्ली की जनता प्यासी रहे। उन्होंने कहा कि हमारे प्रदर्शन को लेकर हरियाणा सरकार की ओर से कोई प्रतिक्रिया नहीं मिली है।

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
