The gates were opened to allow release of water so that the risk in the barrage and upstream region could be minimised About 34 houses were inundated in Nawal-parasi district due to the swelling river.—PTI



Landslides force closure of NH

The Jammu-Srinagar national highway was on Wednesday closed for vehicular traffic due to landslides triggered by rains in Ramban district. "Landslides triggered by heavy rains blocked the highway at Gangroo, Panthal, Seri and Karool in Ramban district. Hundreds of vehicles are stranded at various places," an official said. Men and machinery have been deployed to clear the highway and make it trafficable. Many parts of the Valley were also lashed by rains. The weatherman said more rains are likely in the region on Thursday.

Rudi Ram of Janipur, and Sakshi Sharma (7), daughter of Romesh Chander residing at Janipur, got washed away in the flash flood in the Janipur area while they were on the way to a school.

Reports from Rajouri said torrential rains coupled with thunderstorm damaged four houses in the district. At Sawni village, a woman identified as Arshad Begam died due to a house collapse.

In Ramban, a JCB driver identified as Soran Singh of Punjab sustained critical injuries after he came under the debris of a landslide. He was rushed to District Hospital at Ramban from where he was being shifted to Jammu. In Kathua, traffic on Bani-Basohli, Bani-Daggar Kathua-Basohli remained hit.

Civic bodies ask govt to hand over road maintenance, blame it for waterlogging

NEW DELHI: As waterlogging on arterial roads slowed down traffic in Delhi, leaders of the three municipal corporations on Wednesday demanded that all roads maintained by the Delhi government should be handed over to them.

Multiple agencies are responsible for the maintenance of roads and drains in the Capital. Earlier, most roads were maintained by the civic bodies. In 2012, over 600 roads that were more than 60-feet wide were handed over the government's Public Works Department (PWD).

The demand by the corporations comes at a time when the road-maintenance agencies are receiving flak for their failure to prevent waterlogging and potholes during monsoon.

North Delhi Mayor Sanjeev Nayyar said the condition of he roads had deteriorated ever ince they were taken over by he Delhi government. He said

the roads should be handed back to the corporation to ensure waterlogging is contained.

"Due to multiplicity of agencies, there is an overlapping of jurisdiction," said Nayyar. "Even though the municipal corporations have already desilted drains, several roads in the city are flooded due to the inefficiency of the Delhi government," the Mayor said.

Ashish Sood, member of the standing committee in the south Delhi corporation, said the civic bodies managed 5,000 km of drains in colonies and all roads that are less than 60-feet wide.

"The Delhi government has not cleaned drains on its roads leading to waterlogging. It is now trying to defame the corporations. It is highly condemnable," said Sood.

Sood claimed that despite having a budget of R1,800 crore for maintenance of roads and drains, it could not prevent waterlogging. "Despite facing a severe financial crisis, the civic bodies finished their work," said Sood.

Delhi government officials denied the allegations and accused the corporations of doing politics over misery of the citizens. "We are working round-the-clock to ensure a smoother ride for the Delhiites during the monsoon. We are trying to improve the system which has deteriorated because of the municipal corporations," said a senior official.

Meanwhile, the Delhi high court on Wednesday rapped the PWD for not cleaning the construction debris from Kushak nallah adjoining South Extension-I. It directed the civic body to complete the work within three weeks.

The court was hearing a PIL over waterlogging in South Extension-I, which is being monitored by the high court since 2012.

After two years of drought, good monsoon revives farm activity; record sowing this year

BENGALURU: After severe drought over the last two years, Karnataka is witnessing a revival in agricultural activities, Agriculture Minister Krishna Byre Gowda said on Tuesday.

Speaking to reporters here, he said Karnataka witnessed its most extensive sowing in the last five years, owing to good rainfall in June and July. Till July 25 this year, sowing had taken place in 49.39 lakh hectares, which is 150% more than the average sowing trend. Last year, sowing had taken place in just 34.59 lakh hectares, he added.

Stating that the targeted sowing area was 73 lakh hectares this year, Gowda said his department also hoped to achieve the targeted 100.72 lakh tonnes of food grain production during the period. The department also recorded an increase in sowing of pulses, soya, jowar and groundnut.





Rain, waterlogging, tree falls affect traffic across Bengaluru

BENGALURU: Traffic was affected at a few places in the city on Tuesday after rains uprooted trees and left the roads waterlogged.

Slow vehicular movement was reported in Whitefield, KR Puram hanging bridge, Outer Ring Road from Old Madras Road to Iblur Junction, from Doddanekkundi Salem Bridge towards Marathahalli, near Bilekahalli, Bannerghatta Road and at Veerasandra junction. The fire force was deployed to drain out the water at some places.

Trees were uprooted at Girinagar, Banaswadi, Srinagar, Kumaraswamy Layout, Jedi Mara at JP Nagar, near Sheshadripuram College, Mico Layout and behind Indiranagar bus depot.

Similarly, water logging and potholes affected traffic along the Marathahalli bridge, Hebbal area and Central Silk Board.

"I was struck on Outer Ring Road, Mahadevapura near More supermarket for about three hours. I reached office very late. The road is in a bad shape with potholes and uneven footpaths. I hope the civic agency does something about

it," said a motorist and resident of Nagawara, Vanitha D.

Slow traffic was reported at Anepalya Junction on Hosur Road. Potholes and waterlogging led to a traffic jam. Traffic on the Outer Ring Road near Kasturinagar towards Tin Factory was also jammed due to water logging.

The city recorded a maximum rainfall of 33 mm in the last 24 hours up to 8.30 pm on Tuesday while 72 mm of rainfall was recorded in and around Kempegowda International Airport. HAL received 19 mm of rainfall. Tempera-

tures hovered around 30 degree Celsius throughout the day. According to the Met department, the southwest monsoon has been active over south interior Karnataka but weak over coastal Karnataka and north interior Karnataka. According to the local forecast for Bengaluru city and its neighbourhood, it will be generally cloudy with a few spells of rain/thundershowers in the next 24 hours. The maximum and minimum temperatures are likely to be around 27 and 20 degree Celsius respectively.

Flood situation grim in Morigaon, Lakhimpur districts

CORRESPONDENTS

MORIGAON, July 25: The overall flood situation in Morigaon district took a grim turn today as the surging water of the Brahmaputra inundated more than 100 villages in Bhuragaon and Mayong revenue circles affecting nearly one lakh people in the district.

Official sources here said in the worst hit Mayong circle, more than 50,000 people are taking shelter on dykes and PWD roads. As many as three PWD roads Balimukh-Burgaon, Mayong-Kachasila, Sildubi-Buraburi were washed away in several places. A huge number of domestic animals have also died in the circle.

The whole of Pobitora Wlidlife Sanctuary, the densest habitat of the one-horned rhinos was flooded. According to official sources, the sanctuary was completely under water today in the morning, forcing all wild animals including rhinos, wild buffaloes, wild pigs, several species of snakes and birds to go to nearby highlands, causing concern among the nature loving organi-

sations. The shortage of green grains and other fodder in the Pobitora Wild Life Sanctuary has created a crisis for the rhinos and other animals. However, no poaching was reported. The forest staff with limited logistic support are maintaining round the clock vigil to combat any kind of poaching inside the Sanctuary.

NORTH LAKHIMPUR: The flood situation in Lakhimpur district continues to be grim as incessant rains lashed the district on Sunday.

The overflowing water of Singra river in Nowboicha revenue circle has flooded a wide area in Borchola and Pandhowa areas damaging roads and submerging paddy fields. Singra's flood water has inundated a huge area in Borchola in Nowboicha destroying newly-planted rice seedlings in a wide area. It also damaged many fisheries of this region besides damaging many rural roads with RCC culverts. As a result, villagers are forced to travel in boats in this area.

Similarly Bogolee river, originating in the hills of neighbouring Arunachal

Pradesh and flowing through the midwestern part of Lakhimpur district has been causing floods in a wide area as rain have been lashing the region for almost a week. The river, which does not have any embankments on either of its sides has been in spate since the last week, following heavy rains in the hills of Arunachal Pradesh.

The Bogolee river breached the embankment on the South Laluk GP in No.1 Bogori village has inundated a wide area of this region. The river changed its course through that breached point and added more volume to other small rivers like Meneha, Jadumani and Singiya of that area, flooding agricultural lands and damaging roads and culverts. Along with flood by the rivers, overflown by the change of course by Bogolee river, massive erosion has been on in this region since the last week. The erosion by Jadumani and Meneha rivers has damaged a level pool inside the campus of Laluk College near Karunabari Development Block. The non-existence of any embankment on the Bogolee river is responsible for the

flood and erosion taking place in this mid-western area of Lakhimpur district where heavy rain in the hills of Arunach-al Pradesh always causes flash floods on this river.

Meanwhile, the villagers in Niz-La-luk GP are in great distress as a damaged bridge has not been reconstructed in the last one year. The RCC bridge on Laluk-Balicharani was swept away by the flood waters of Gabhoru last year and the reconstruction having not started so far, has now made the lives of the villagers miserable. The villagers have to cross this portion of the road in chest deep water, during this monsoon facing a lot of trouble and danger every day.

Meanwhile, floods have affected 846 hectares of agricultural land in Laluk mouza of Lakhimpur district also. The latest flood has affected 4,720 agrarian families of 38 revenue villages of Laluk Agricultural Circle Sali rice seedlings in 195 hectares of land, vegetables in 217 hectares and Bodo paddy in 57 hectares of land were damaged.

Rain continues to lash North Bengal

KOLKATA: The state government has issued a flood alert for Jalpaiguri district in North Bengal, with similar measures being taken for the districts of Darjeeling, Alipurduar and Cooch Behar.

Heavy rain since Sunday afternoon have left most tea-gardens in the region submerged and could lead to heavy losses, officials said.

Officials said that while all four districts in North Bengal have been lashed by heavy rain since Sunday afternoon and

water levels have risen across the region, Jalpaiguri was hit the worst.

The State Secretariat asked district authorities to issue a flood alert in Jalpaiguri, where heavy rain in the upper reaches of river Teesta have affected hundreds of villages.

In Jalpaiguri town, water has flooded houses and commercial establishments, bringing life to a standstill.

Local news channels showed visuals of people wading through waterlogged streets,

waist-deep in some places. Road connectivity has been severely hit, particularly those connecting to the neighbouring Bhutan.

Rail traffic has also been disrupted with a large number of trains; starting or terminating in the region, having been delayed by hours. The flood situation has forced schools, colleges and offices to be shut in Jalpaiguri, as roads have merged into the river.

While officials at the state secretariat in Kolkata are mon-

itoring the situation, the National Disaster Response Force (NDRF) has been called to employ relief and rescue missions. NDRF and district disaster management personnel have already evacuated residents of more than 100 villages to higher ground.

"The district administration is on high alert and we're looking at all contingencies to control the situation," Barun Roy, divisional commissioner of Jalpaiguri, told reporters.





Around 60,000 hit by floods in Jonai, 19 relief camps opened

CORRESPONDENT

JONAI, July 25: Incessant rain since the last one week in the upper reaches of Arunachal Pradesh has caused flash floods in Jonai revenue circle in Dhemaji district, where around 60,000 people have been affected.

Continuous moderate to heavy downpour in the region has inundated vast riverine areas of the sub-division and damaged about 1,000 hectares of standing crops at Bahir-Jonai, Rayang Bijoypur, Ramdhon, Laimerkuri, and Misamara panchayats.

Sources from the civil administration here informed that about 60,000 people of 226 villages have been affected by the flash floods. The overflowing waters of Jonai and Lali rivers have breached dykes at Mohmara and Bahir-Jonai last night and flooded two sites and inundated 19 villages, besides submerging PWD and rural roads.

Likewise, overflowing water of Lali (downstream of Siang) breached a protective dyke at Santipur and inundated Berachapori area. Human habitation at Beramilon, Tarigaon, Malbhug and Bholukaguri areas are reeling under waist-deep water. Several hundred affected people in the areas are taking shelter on the remaining dykes and highlands without sufficient food and housing.

The Jonai Circle Officer, who is monitoring the situation, informed that the sub-divisional administration has opened 19 relief camps at different places and supplying tarpaulin (roofing) and food material for the affected families.

District-level members of TMPK (Mising students) and local NGO activists are working in the affected areas and monitoring the situation round the clock.

Over 50 Kokrajhar villages reeling under floods

KOKRAJHAR, July 25: Following incessant rain in the catchment areas of Bhutan and Assam, the water level of rivers like Sankosh, Champa, Saralbhanga and others flowing through Kokrajhar district has witnessed a rising trend leading to devastation here.

Considering the situation, Kokrajhar Deputy Commissioner Madhaw Prasad Sharma held a district-level meeting today at the conference hall of the DC's office here to review the overall flood situation in the district with all the concerned departmental heads.

In the meeting, Sharma took stock of the overall flood situation in the district and the concerned heads of the departments present in the meeting apprised him of the actual situation following the current wave of floods.

The Kokrajhar Deputy Commissioner also visited Saraspara and other areas where the river Saralbhanga caused massive damage.

More than 50 villages were flooded in Kokrajhar following the rising water level of different rivers flowing through Kokrajhar district, he said, adding that requisite relief items have been distributed in six relief centres.

Nine medical teams, besides mobile medical units have been pressed into service, Sharma said. Two pregnant ladies were rescued from Khasiabari village and medical treatment offered to them. Rain brings down temperature, tempers

SRINAGAR, JULY 27

Heavy showers lashed the Kashmir valley on Wednesday, inundating roads and bringing calm to streets of the region a day after protesters defied separatist appeal for relaxation and held widespread demonstrations.

The rainfall began early

morning and continued throughout the day causing a considerable drop in the temperature and cloaking the region in cold wintry weather.

Many roads in Srinagar, the state's summer capital, were inundated by rainwater as police and paramilitary personnel imposing curfew and restrictions took shelter of covered pavements.

The state government imposed curfew in many parts of Srinagar a day after removing deployment of security forces and lifting curfew from the volatile old city neighbourhoods.

"A strict curfew is in place and no one is being allowed to move outside. A large number of police and CRPF men are deployed on the road," said Tanveer Ahmad, a resident of Khanyar locality of Srinagar's old city.

The downpour on Wednesday, however, brought calm to the seething streets of the region. The roads were empty of traffic and markets were closed as the unrest has shown no signs of an end.

The Met department has forecast rain till Friday.

Curfew back in Valley, Hurriyat leaders detained

A day after protests in the old city, curfew was clamped in downtown Srinagar following fresh incidents of stone-throwing while restrictions remained in force in south Kashmir towns on Wednesday. The measures were taken to foil the separatists' bid for a march to Kulgam in south Kashmir even as the police detained Syed Ali Shah Geelani and Mirwaiz Umar Farooq. Curfew restrictions continued in Anantnag, Kulgam, Pulwama, Awantipora and parts of Shopian and were enforced in Kulgam, Khudwani and Qoimoh. — TNS News item/letter/article/editorial published on

New Delhit Rainfall contain ued over Delhi for the second consecutive day as the Safdarjung observatory recorded 12.2 mm rain between 8.30am and 5.30pm.

The thick cloud cover for most day and intermittent rain saw the maximum temperature plummet four degrees below normal to settle at 30.8 degrees Celsius, while the minimum was 26.8 degrees Celsius.

The Met department said that the southwest monsoon had been vigorous over Jammu and Kashmir and active over Himachal Pradesh, Uttarakhand, west Uttar Pradesh and east Rajasthan.

"More rainfall is expected over the region in the next three to four days. Fairly widespread to widespread rain is likely over Himachal Pradesh, Uttarakhand, Punjab, Haryana, Chandigarh, Delhi, Uttar Pradesh and east Rajasthan," said a Met official.

The department said that a cyclonic circulation over Maharashtra and Madhya Pradesh was likely to move over east Rajasthan and adjoining areas shortly. The system is bringing a huge amount of moisture from the Arabian Sea and converging with easterly winds from the Bay of Bengal over Rajasthan and Gujarat.

Assam flood toll 12, CM monitors relief work

Guwahati, 27 **J**uly

The current wave of flood has claimed 12 lives and affected nearly 16 lakh people across Assam, the state Assembly was informed today.

Making a statement on the flood situation, chief minister Sarbananda Sonowal declared an ex-gratia of Rs 4 lakh to the families of each of the deceased and said the amount will be paid this week.

"Flood is the most burning problem of the state. The current flood has affected almost all constituencies and has become a serious problem. It has claimed 12 lives so far and hit nearly 16 lakh people across 19 districts," he told the Assembly.

The government is closely monitoring the situation and has been holding regular discussions with officials of various departments, mainly those responsible for flood relief and rehabilitation, Sonowal said.

"We have specifically directed the DCs and SDOs to depute officials for flood-related works and do a detailed study of the situation. Health and Veterinary departments have been asked to go to the people and evaluate the situation," he added.

The government has asked the authorities concerned to provide all necessary support to the people living in the relief camps, the Chief Minister said while making his statement during the Budget Session of the Assembly.

"As soon as the flood problem hit the state, we released funds to all the DCs (Deputy Commissioners). Earlier, all DCs used to complain about lack of funds, but this time it will not happen," he added.

Sonowal also informed about his discussion with union home minister Rajnath Singh, who had yesterday assured all possible help from the Centre in tackling the problem.

Sonowal today directed the Deputy Commissioners of flood- hit districts to step up relief and rescue operations. In an unprecedented move, the Assam Assembly was today adjourned for the next three days for allowing MLAs to visit flood-affected constituencies and give a report to the Chief Minister.

In Jammu, two minor girls were washed away in flash floods triggered by heavy rains today where several areas have been submerged as authorities sounded a flood alert in river Tawi. Around 10.30 a.m today two girls ~ nine-year old Menakshi, a class IV student and seven-year old Shakshi Sharmalwere washed away in flash floods in a nallah in Janipura belt of Jammu city, Deputy Commissioner Jammu Simrandeep Singh said.

Arunachal: Arunachal Pradesh chief minister Pema Khandu convened a high-level emergency meeting here to review the flood situation in the state which remained grim in four districts. The meeting took place last night upon his arrival from New Delhi.

The chief minister asked all the departments to coordinate and work out a state emergency mitigation plan under the supervision of the chief secretary, an official communiquesaid.
