Rehmatud Din walked 10 hours and scrambled through landslide debris to reach his family in this remote northwestern town that was devastated by a 7.5 magnitude earthquake this week

When he finally arrived, he learned that his 6-year-old daughter had died after being crushed by the roof of their home, and that she had already been buried by relatives.

"I did my best to reach Chitral but boulders and landslides had blocked all the roads," Din said Thursday, tears welling in his eyes. "I lost her at such a young age," But he needs to rebuild his shelter before the winter sets in. Residents of the hill resort. Chitral which has suffered extensive damage, were trying to salvage their possessions They called for government help to repair their homes, saving they are too poor to do it themselves Housing was urgently needed, with snow already falling on nearby mountains.

The death toll from Monday's quake centered in Afghanistan's sparsely populated Badakhshan province that borders Pakistan, Tajikistan and China stood at 390. According to officials, at least 272 people were



killed in Pakistan, 121 in Afghanistan and three on the Indian side of the dis-

puted Kashmir region.

At least 50 people were killed in the nearby Shangla, the country's worst affected area

Din, a 45-year-old construction worker, was on a job in the nearby town of Gilgit when the earth-quake struck. He said his wife gathered their six other children in an open area outside their home, but 6-year-old Zar Shi was caught in the roof collapse. She died at the local hospital after neighbors pulled her out from the rubble

NEW DELHI: India and African nations decided on Thursday to step up cooperation to fight climate change and terrorism, as Prime Minister Narendra Modi made a strong pitch for partnership in these key areas amid shared concerns about global warming and extremist groups like Boko Haram.

At the third India-Africa summit in Delhi, visiting leaders backed Modi's call for a "comprehensive" agreement on climate change at a UN conference to be

Heavy showers evade water-starved city

Northeast monsoon, officially, arrived over the State on Wednesday. But, rain continued to play hide and seek with Chennai city.

Tambaram recorded a whopping 9 cm (at 8 a.m. on Wednesday) following a heavy overnight rain, while Chembarambakkam (5 cm) and Meenambakkam (1.4 cm) also received good overnight showers. However, it only drizzled in many parts of the city, and Nungambakkam received less than 1 cm of rain between 8.30 a.m. and 5.30 p.m. on Wednesday.

However, a low pressure area over southwest Bay of Bengal and the adjoining Sri Lanka coast is expected to bring more rain to Chennai on Thursday. S.R. Ramanan, director of Area Cyclone Warning Centre, said the sky would be generally cloudy on Thursday as well. The city is expected to experience light-to-moderate rain. "We are monitoring the weather system and the possibility of it intensifying into depression. As of now, rainfall will be widespread in the coastal areas," he said.

This rain spell is imperative for the water-starved city. It is now largely sustained by drinking water supplied from desalination plants in Minjur and Nemmeli, and nearly 120 million litres of water a day from over 200 agricultural wells in Tiruvallur district. The reservoir in Chembarambakkam received 200 cubic feet of water following good showers in the catchment areas on Tuesday night.

Chennai recorded 10 cm of rainfall against the average of 23 cm since October 1.

Meanwhile, Chennai Metrowater is preparing to tackle monsoon issues. With more than 75,000 manholes in the city, the damaged covers will be replaced and depot engineers will monitor sewage overflow and check for water contamination complaints.

Residents may contact the 24/7 Metrowater helpline 4567 4567 as staff members will work in three shifts, including holidays, to attend calls during the monsoon. They may also get in touch with the area engineers for monsoon-related complaints.

Yamuna activists seek action on new encroachments

NEW DELHI: Yamuna activists urged lieutenant-governor Najeeb Jung to take notice of the around 20 hutments that have sprung up on the west bank of the river, and sought immediate action to prevent the encroachments from spreading.

"The encroachment is very recent and is small right now, but if immediate action is not taken, it will encourage more people to build houses in the area. It doesn't take a long times for these temporary hutments to become permanent unauthorised colonies," said Manoj Misra, an environmentalist involved for several years with efforts to save the Yamuna.

THE NATIONAL GREEN TRIBUNAL PROHIBITS ANY NEW CONSTRUCTION ON THE RIVER BANK

According to Misra, the encroachments that have sprouted over the past three months have gone completely unnoticed by the relevant authorities.

Google satellite images of the area show a small portion of encroachments in a green belt between the Outer Ring Road and the river.

"There is a narrow but extremely critical patch of remaining flood plain between the ring road and the river channel in the west bank. This is located south of the unau-

thorised Tibetan colony of Majnu Ka Tila and north of the Yamuna Bazar around Nigam Bodh Ghat. Please allow us to being to your kind notice recent instance of fresh attempts at encroachment in what is perhaps the only remaining continuous last green patch in the west bank of the river," the letter written by Misra read.

The National Green Tribunal prohibits any new construction on the river bank and river bed. Various encroachments, however, are routinely reported from across the city - through the heart of which 22 kilometers of the river flows.

Misra pointed out that, apart from the hutments, the people living nearby who park buses and trucks in the green area also add to the problem.

"It is also true that the excess of a few cannot become the burden of many," he said, hinting that developing nations were made to pay for the share of developed countries in climate change.

"So, when the world meets in Paris in December, we look to see a comprehensive and concrete outcome that is based on the well established principles in the UN Convention on Climate Change. We will all do our part for it."

Delegates from about 190 countries are slated to attend the Paris meet with the aim to limit the rise in global temperatures to 2°C above pre-industrial levels and move the world away from fossil fuels.

India has opposed the binding nature of the proposed treaty to be implemented from 2020 and repeatedly said only rich countries are required under a previous UN climate convention to reduce carbon emissions.

"For India, 175 GW of additional renewable energy capacity by 2022 and reduction in emission intensity by 33-35% by 2030 are just two aspects of our efforts," the Prime Minister said, adding that India was making "enormous efforts" with its "modest resources" to combat climate change.

Leaders at the India-Africa summit also agreed to boost cooperation in counter-terrorism and maritime security against the backdrop of the growing menace of outfits like Boko Haram, the terror group based out of north-eastern Nigeria which is a threatening presence in Chad, Niger and northern Cameroon.

"Africa, like the rest of the developing world, has its development challenges. And, like others in the world, it has its own concerns of security and stability, especially from terrorism and extremism," Modi said. "That is why we wish to deepen our cooperation in maritime security and hydrography, and countering terrorism and extremism; and why we must have a UN Comprehensive Convention on International Terrorism (CCIT)."

The CCIT is a treaty proposed by India which is deadlocked at the United Nations for close to two decades. It aims to criminalise all forms of international terrorism and deny terrorists, their financiers and supporters access to funds, arms and safe havens.

The participants called on all countries to ensure their territories were not used for cross-border terrorist activities, while acknowledging that the menace of non-state actors, including armed groups, had acquired "a new dimension".

"We have excellent defence and security cooperation with many African countries. We have done this bilaterally and through multilateral and regional mechanisms. Closer defence and security cooperation, especially in capability development, will be a key pillar of India-Africa partnership," said the Prime Minister. "We will intensify our cooperation against terrorism and rally the world to build a common cause against it."

Save 'last green patch' along Yamuna: activist

With the Yamuna at risk of encroachments despite several court orders, environmentalists now fear that the last green patch of the flood plain on the west bank of the river may be subject to illegal use.

Retired IFS officer and convenor of the Yamuna Jiye Abhiyaan, Manoj Misra, has written to Lieutenant Governor Najeeb Jung and Chief Minister Arvind Kejriwal calling for timely interference to save the green patch at a point when most of the floodplain has already been brought under construction.

Mr. Misra had written to the two authorities earlier as well about the illegal activities being carried out on the Yamuna floodplains. It was on the basis of his petition that the National Green Tribunal banned several activities, including fresh construction on the floodplains.

After the NGT orders, he has written at least five letters highlighting various incidents of encroachment, which seem to be continuing despite the DDA claiming that it has constituted task forces and installed CCTVs to keep a check.

In his recent letter, which was also marked to the DDA vice-chairman, Mr. Misra has highlighted a narrow but "extremely critical" patch of flood plain between the Ring Road and the river channel on the west bank. The patch is located south of the unauthorized Tibetan colony of Majnu Ka Tila and north of the Yamuna bazar around Nigam Bodh Ghat.

He claimed that in the recent past, fresh hutments had been seen in the wooded area just south of the Majnu Ka Tila Gurudwara. This, he said, was a violation of NGT orders.

The activist also expressed concern about the hutments soon becoming permanent structures. The said patch is also reportedly used as parking space for trucks and buses.

Mr. Misra has now requested that the DDA be directed to visit the site and take steps to remove what has been recently built and to prevent a repeat. He suggested that the area be used for planting local species of trees and it be ensured that no structure is now allowed or regularized in Zone 'O'under the Master Plan, 2021.

"Please ask DDA and Govt of NCT of Delhi to conduct an impact assessment of the unauthorised colony at Majnu Ka Tila, and other structures raised on the river bank there, and to plan on their relocation to safeguard both the river's integrity as well as the life and property of people who are living in such flood-prone areas," the letter says.
