### India puts off Pak visit for Indus basin inspection

New Delhi: A visit by an Indian team to, Pakistan for inspection of projects in Indus river basin this month has been postponed, official sources said. While the postponement came amid tensions prevailing in ties since the Pulwama attack, officials did not rule out the possibility of the visit taking place in the next few months.

"There's a window of 12 months for that visit to take place so there's a lot of time," said an official on condition of anonymity. A similar visit by Pakistani team was also postponed in 2018 before it finally took place in January this year.

India is currently preparing to host a Pakistan delegation at Attari on March 14 to finalise the modalities for opening of the Kartarpur corridor. Despite the conflict, the government has continued to maintain that it will not stop people-toDuring the 115th meeting of the Permanent Indus Commission held in Lahore from August 29-30, 2018, both commissioners had agreed to undertake the treatymandated tours of the Indus basin on both sides, the official said.

The tour of the Pakistani side was originally scheduled in October 2018 but was postponed because of local bodies polls in Jammu & Kashmir. The Pakistani team visited India later in the last week of January to inspect projects in the Chenab basin.

The Indian team was supposed to visit Pakistan this month, a senior official said. Under Article VIII of the Treaty, both commissioners are mandated to undertake, once every five years, a general tour of inspection of the rivers for ascertaining the facts connected with various developments and works on both sides.

## Shahpur Kandi project stone laid again Former PM Narasimha Rao had laid foundation of ₹2,700-cr venture 24 yrs ago

PATHANKOT, MARCH 8 Chief Minister Capt Amarinder Singh on Friday laid the foundation stone of the ambitious 206-MW Shahpur Kandi dam project to be built on the Ravi.

The project, when completed in 2022, will allow the country to control its share of the Ravi waters flowing into Pakistan.

The CM was accompanied by Power Minister Gurpreet Singh Kangar and Gurdaspur MP Sunil Jakhar.

This is the second such ceremony. On April 20, 1995, the then Prime Minister, PV Narasimha Rao, had laid the foundation stone and had claimed that the project will be completed in three years. However, the venture hit a roadblock due to various reasons.

The dam has the potential

to provide irrigation water to vast tracts of land in Punjab and J&K. The Indus Waters Treaty, which was signed between India and Pakistan in 1960, had envisaged that the country got full rights

for the utilisation of waters of the Ravi, Beas and Sutlej. However, at present, some water of the Ravi flowed into Pakistan through Madhopur headworks and the dam plans to minimise it.

Work halted repeatedly

November 2001: The dam work was initially approved by the Planning Commission but the work could not make much progress as the state was facing fund crunch

Later when the construction work began, it again got halted following a dispute between Puniab and J&K

"The overall cost of the project is pegged at Rs 2,715.70 crore and is slated to be completed by June 2022," an official said.

"The construction of the dam was initially approved

by the Planning Commission in November 2001 but the work could not make much progress due to the fund crunch in the Punjab Government. Later when the work began, it again got halted following a dispute between Punjab and J&K. A series of meetings held bilaterally and the Centre finally paved the way for an agreement between the two states," Jakhar said.

"The dam's construction is expected to generate hundreds of jobs for both skilled and unskilled workers."

An official disclosed that the dam had been designated as a 'national project' following which its construction would be monitored regularly by the Ministry of Water Resources. The Centre would extend whatever assistance is required by Punjab and J&K for the implementation of the project.

### Reservoir storage levels dip to 36% of capacity

New Delhi, March 8

The cumulative water storage in major reservoirs across the country plummeted sharply to 58.723 billion cubic metres (BCM) in one week, according to data released by the Central Water Commission (CWC).

The total storage of water in 91 CWC-monitored reservoirs on Thursday stood at 36 per cent of the storage capacity as compared to 40 per cent a week ago.

Among the States that have reported lower storage as compared to the corresponding period last year were Rajasthan, Jharkhand, Odisha, West Bengal, Gujarat, Maharashtra, Uttar Pradesh and Kerala. On the other

hand, water storage levels are better compared to last year in Himachal Pradesh, Madhya Pradesh, Chhattisgarh, Karnataka and Tamil Nadu, the statement said.

The Western region seems to be the worst hit, with

severe drought conditions prevailing. The water storage in 27 key reservoirs in the region stood at 8.01 BCM — 26 per cent of the live capacity. The water storage in the same period last year was at 37 per cent.

Dams in South India, too, have been affected with total storage at 28 per cent. However, this year's levels are relatively better than the previous year's 25 per cent.

Storage levels in reservoirs in the North, which has been receiving ample winter rains, have improved dramatically. As against 29 per cent storage in the corresponding period last year, the storage was 53 per cent of the total live storage, i.e., 18.01 BCM.

The storage in eastern India and central India was 50 per cent and 40 per cent, respectively, as compared to 56 per cent and 34 per cent during the corresponding period last year, the statement said.
